1. Success Story

MI-SBTDC Works with Indian Communities, from *GVSU Now*, January 9, 2012

The Michigan Small Business & Technology Development Center (MI-SBTDC) network, located at Grand Valley State University, received a two-year, \$200,000 award to increase assistance to American Indian communities across the state. The funds will be used to help start or grow businesses.

“The funding allows the MI-SBTDC network to increase business assistance to the 12 federally recognized Indian tribes and their members through hiring two business consultants and opening several Business Resource Centers dedicated to outreach in these communities,” said Carol Lopucki, state director of the MI-SBTDC. “The consultants have annual impact goals of acquiring \$2 million in capital, performing 750 consulting hours and creating 25 jobs.”

The Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC) and its department for Tribal Business Development will assist with the initiative. Terri Fitzpatrick, vice President for Tribal Business Development said, “We are excited to be working with the MI-SBTDC on this initiative.”

Elaine Clement and Ross Miller will serve as MI-SBTDC tribal business consultants. Clement is a member of the Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians and Ross is a member of the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians. They will assist clients with analyzing business problems, developing solutions and providing access to resources.

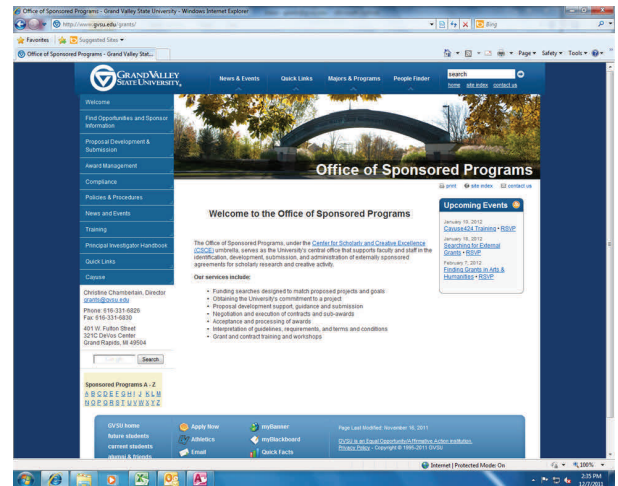
“The funding will strengthen the American Indian business community,” said Clement. “I look forward to working with the American Indian tribes as well as tribal members to develop their business ideas.”

The MI-SBTDC will also assist American Indians by providing access to specialty team consultants, customized market research for information-based planning reports and business training to increase the knowledge and understanding of operating a successful business.

It's Final: NIH Dissolves NCRP and Creates NCATS, *from GrantWeek, January 9, 2012*

The National Institutes of Health (NIH) has been alerting the research community for months about the impending demise of its National Center for Research Resources (NCRP) and the proposed establishment of the National Center for Advancing Translational Sciences (NCATS). The transition became official on January 6, 2012 with two notices, one to [dissolve NCRP](#) and another to [create NCATS](#). All [existing NCRP awards and pending applications](#) are being transferred immediately to other institutes and centers within NIH, including NCATS.

Since NIH has never abolished an institute or center before, the potential exists for an administrative nightmare. Applicant program directors and principal investigators and institutional officials will receive multiple e-mails from NIH explaining where their NCRP applications and awards will be administered and identifying the appropriate NIH contact person. Some of these communications will be system-generated e-mails sent as changes are made in the eRA Commons regarding the transfer. These transfers will not change any of the terms and conditions of the current awards or the level of funding anticipated for future non-competing awards. As with all NIH awards, the most up-to-date information and point of contact for each award or application will be found in the eRA Commons. NCRP's replacement, NCATS, represents NIH's commitment to re-engineer the process of translating scientific discoveries into new drugs, diagnostics, and devices. Working closely with partners in the regulatory, academic, nonprofit, and private sectors, NCATS will strive to identify and overcome hurdles that slow the development of effective treatments and cures. Human Development Institute Offers R15 Support, *from GrantWeek, December 19, 2011*

The Eunice Kennedy Shriver National Institute of Child Health and Human Development (NICHD) is [seeking proposals](#) to strengthen developmental biology research at colleges and universities that have not been major recipients of National Institutes of Health (NIH) support. This opportunity uses the Academic Research Enhancement Award (AREA, or R15) grant mechanism, which is limited to institutions that have received less than \$6 million in NIH support in four of the last seven years. Applications are due by **September 10** annually through 2014.

GRC members at eligible institutions are encouraged to identify developmental biologists who otherwise would be unlikely to participate in NIH-funded research, to make them aware of this funding availability. Awards of up to \$300,000 in direct costs support small-scale developmental biology research projects, often at small, primarily undergraduate, and minority-serving institutions.

Applicants are encouraged to propose the use of novel or underutilized animal models and to enhance undergraduate students' exposure to the basic concepts of research on the molecular and cellular bases of embryonic development. The scope of interest includes normal embryonic development, developmental defects of generalized body patterning, and localized dysmorphic anomalies across a variety of organ systems. Behavioral development and intellectual disabilities are not the focus of this solicitation; related proposals should be submitted to the AREA [parent announcement](#). NICHD requested information in June 2011 about ways to build NIH research capacity at non-research intensive institutions. GRC replied, suggesting as one strategy that NIH institutes and centers use the R15 grant mechanism more frequently (program announcements normally support the R01, R03, and R21 grant mechanisms). AREA-eligible members should be heartened to know the value NICHD places on the excellent biomedical research conducted on their campuses. The institute is working with AREA program director Erica Brown on another R15 solicitation that Brown says "should hit the street soon."

Call to Action from Unlikely Bedfellows: NEA and HHS, from *GrantWeek*, December 12, 2011

A recent [announcement](#) by the National Endowment of the Arts (NEA) should serve as striking motivation for colleges and universities to mobilize interdisciplinary teams from the arts, social sciences, health sciences, and education. A new interagency task force is working to “encourage more and better research on how the arts help people reach their full potential at all stages of life.” Led by NEA, the task force will unite several U.S. Department of Health and Services (HHS) agencies, the National Science Foundation, the U.S. Department of Education, and the Institute of Museum and Library Services in implementing a federal research agenda for the arts and human development.

The task force will conduct web-based and other outreach, lead a gap-analysis and literature review of federally sponsored research on the arts and human development, support joint research funding opportunities across agencies, and facilitate institutions’ capacity to compete for related discretionary funding.

This is a significant development in an era marked by peak worldwide investments in science, technology, engineering, and math research and education. The task force grew out of a March 2011 meeting convened by NEA chair Rocco Landesman and HHS secretary Kathleen Sebelius to explore the role of the arts in the fulfillment of individual well-being. It’s an interesting image: the heads of two agencies that have been working for decades to reverse a plaguing perception that federal grants are free money for the lone artist or scientist to pursue their life’s passion, now brainstorming ways to empower all people to live their best life.

The March meeting led to the development of a [white paper](#), “The Arts and Human Development,” which lays out the strategy behind the NEA-HHS partnership. “A worthy aim of [the] collaboration is to foster data-driven models for including the arts in policies and programs that seek to improve the well-being of Americans at different stages of their lives.”

Establishing the task force was the first step. If the white paper continues to serve as the blueprint for this initiative, then the applicant community should assemble teams that will be ready to take part in a near-future series of technical workshops to build capacity and begin framing research proposals. At the institutional (or inter-institutional) level, this means connecting methodologists and content experts in neuroscience, health, education, and the arts now.

When the federal mountain moves this quickly — and it doesn’t get much quicker than nine months from concept to launch — it cues the campus community to respond in kind. This is the stage at which the leaders are identified, and this is the type of priority that GRC and AASCU members, by virtue of their relative size, nimbleness, and placement within the community, are perfectly positioned to answer.

The white paper identifies many of the specific lacunae the task force hopes to address, providing an excellent framework for initial conversations within the institution. GRC will continue to monitor developments within the participating agencies and will share additional details with members as soon as they emerge.
