Biographical note: Chronology

- 1928 Born Russell George Mawby on February 23 in Kent County, Michigan. He was the third of four children of Wesley Mawby and Ruby A. (Finch) Mawby.
- 1949 Russell graduated magna cum laude from Michigan State University with a Bachelor's degree in horticulture.
- 1951 Graduated from Purdue University with a Master's in Agricultural Economics.
- 1953 Drafted into the army October 3. Assigned to the Army Field Artillery School at Fort Smith, Arkansas.
- 1955 Received an Honorary Discharge from the Army in October.
- 1956 Appointed Assistant Director of Michigan State University's Cooperative Extension Service and Director of 4-H and Youth Programs.
- 1959 Graduated from Michigan State University with a Doctorate in Agricultural Economics.
- 1964 Named Director of the Division of Agriculture at the W. K. Kellogg Foundation.

- 1964 Moved to Battle Creek, Michigan.
- 1966 Named Vice President of Programs at the W. K. Kellogg Foundation.
- 1967 Named Vice President and member of the Foundation's Board of Trustees.
- 1970 Named President and Chief Executive Officer of the W. K. Kellogg Foundation (later title changed to Chairman in 1982).
- 1992 Joined the Michigan State University Board of Trustees.
- 1995 Retired as Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of the W. K. Kellogg Foundation.
- 1996 Joined the Board of the Battle Creek Community Foundation.

Russell Mawby Papers

Collection description summary:

The Russell Mawby collection documents the life and work of Michigan-born Russell Mawby from 1928 to the present. Mawby was the Chief Executive Officer and Chairman of the W. K. Kellogg Foundation for twenty-five years and is recognized for his work in the area of philanthropy in the United States, Latin America, and Europe. From an early age his parents instilled in him the importance of a good education. This along with farming and agriculture, Boy Scouts, and 4-H programs, influenced the type of philanthropic work he was involved in at the Foundation. Russell Mawby currently lives in Michigan with his wife.

The collection includes biographical information, interviews, legislative testimony, speeches, calendars, field notes, awards and citations, honorary degrees, books and publications, and a binder from the W. K. Kellogg Foundation and include photographs and duplicates of speeches and interviews already in the Mawby collection.

Series descriptions:

Series 1: Biographical Information

Biographical information documents the details of Russell Mawby's life and career before and during the time that he worked for the W. K. Kellogg Foundation. Files include magazine articles related to his life and career, the Curriculum Vitae, a history of the W. K. Kellogg Foundation by Dr. Helen Grace entitled *A Chronological Overview of Programming*, and a biographical reference by James M. Richmond entitled *Recollections of a Man Whose Epitaph Would Say 'He Cared.'*

Series 2: Interviews

Interview files document Mawby's early life and his career at the W. K. Kellogg Foundation including topics such as the life of W. K. Kellogg, the history of the Foundation, and Kellogg Foundation programs. Additional and duplicate interviews are also in the W. K. Kellogg Foundation binder.

Series 3: Legislative Testimony

Legislative testimony files document Mawby's involvement in changing philanthropy during the 1970s and 1980s. His testimony included proposals for changes in laws that affect private foundations, including the Tax Reform Act of 1979 and the Foundation Tax Act of 1969. He also spoke out against proposed regulations that would negatively affect private foundations, and promoted changes that would benefit foundations.

Series 4: Speeches

Speech files document Mawby's participation in events such as commencement ceremonies, inaugurations, banquets, annual conferences and business meetings, dedications, fund raising events and seminars from 1954 to 1996. Additional speeches from the W. K. Kellogg Foundation binder were copied for this series.

Series 5: Calendars

Calendars document the daily activities of Mawby from 1967- 1995 while working for the W. K. Kellogg Foundation.

Series 6: Field Notes

Field notes document trips taken by Mawby to approve and evaluate proposed and awarded grants by the Foundation. The notes include recommendations and information on proposals for future projects, evaluations of programs that were already granted support, interviews from Fellows in the programs, and collaborations with other foundations including the Rockefeller Foundation and the Ford Foundation. Notes cover trips taken to Latin America, Europe, and the U.S.

Series 7: Awards and citations

Awards and citations received by Mawby for his contributions to youth programs, universities, government agencies, nonprofit organizations, foundations, and international programs. Files are arranged in two groups: 1) Award files, 2) Plaques and memorabilia. Award files include all paper documents and certificates received, and the plaques and memorabilia include plaques, and three dimensional objects. Additional material held at the Dorothy A. Johnson Center of Philanthropy.

Series 8: Honorary degrees

Honorary degrees awarded in fields of agriculture, law, humane letters, public administration, public service, science and humanities. Files are arranged in two groups: 1) Degree files, 2) Academic regalia. Degree files include the degree, invitations, photographs and commencement announcements, programs and invitations, newspaper articles, and speeches. The regalia include caps and hoods from each university. Additional material held at the Dorothy A. Johnson Center of Philanthropy.

Series 9: Binder from W. K. Kellogg Foundation

The binder from the W. K. Kellogg Foundation includes duplicates of photographs, speeches, and interviews from the Kellogg Foundation Archives.

Series 10: Books and publications

Annual reports from W.K. Kellogg Foundation, 1965-1995 from the time he was Director of the Division of Agriculture to 1970 when he became CEO (President /Chairman). The remaining books are part of the Johnson Center library.

January 8, 1965- Michigan State University

Meeting with Dean Jeanette Lee, College of Home Economies to determine how the Foundation would be most effective in supporting the program. Possibilities of its use would be fellowships for the students, field work, pilot work, home economies work in inner-city areas, nursery school programs, and housing.

January 15, 1965- Michigan State University

Meeting with Dean T.K. Cowden about the agricultural programs that the Foundation supported. The Dean spoke of four areas of concern and also provided contact names.

January 24-28, 1965- Washington, D.C.

Trip to participate in the Fifth Annual Farm Policy Review Conference sponsored by The Center for Agriculture and Economic Development at Iowa State University and the Agriculture Policy Institute at North Carolina State. Information was presented on domestic farm policies, problems of rural America, and international trade in farm products. Mawby met with the 4-H staff and Youth Development Division of the Federal Extension Services to explain the Foundation and its contributions to rural youth.

February 16-17, 1965- Chicago, Illinois

Meeting with Farm Foundation program Advisory Committee member, Dr. T. W. Schultz. The Farm Foundation was set up for the 'enrichment of rural life and living.' Mawby described the goals of the Division of Agriculture and the Kellogg Foundation, and answered questions that Dr. Schultz had about the Foundation. Mawby also met with Ralph Kirch, Director of Resources at the National 4-H Club Foundation, to discuss how 4-H programs were running throughout the country.

February 19, 1965- Michigan State University

Trip to Michigan State to visit the Foundation Fellows and discuss their progress. Mawby spoke with faculty about the need in the United States and also other countries for more people trained in economics and agriculture. He recommended that in order for courses to be more beneficial, information on recent changes in agriculture and economics needed to be taught in universities.

February 25, 1965- Michigan State University

Meeting at Michigan State University to discuss the start of the Experimental Leadership Development Program for Agriculture with Dr. L. L. Boger and Dr. David Boyne. Mawby discussed changes and questions that had arisen from the proposal of the program. The program was designed to help increase leaders of farming in agriculture, and to further the education of those involved. Mawby also met with the editor of Farm radio, Mr. Richard Arnold; and a Foundation Fellow, Mr. Patrick Brennan.

March 2, 1965- University of Michigan

Meeting with Dr. Lee R. Martin and Dr. Ayers Brinser of the School of Natural Resources at the University of Michigan to discuss agricultural colleges in the six New England states. Colleges included those within the College of Agriculture, the Land-Grant Universities, the Land-Grant Universities in New England and those that provided support for national and international programs. They discussed programs designed to help poverty in rural areas focused on full employment, agricultural reorganization, human resource development, social overhead capital, area planning and development, leadership development, and income transfers. They looked at why people move out of rural areas and they discussed how changing the employment opportunities in rural areas could change poverty and the need for people to leave. Mawby shared information on the Foundation and its focus for the communities and people that it helps, and discussed how the Foundation's resources could help their program.

March 8-11, 1965- North Carolina State University

Visit to North Carolina to review the progress of the Agricultural Policy Institute. Meetings were held with Kellogg Fellows and their advisors, Dean James, and also Dr. William Bowden of the Southern Regional Education Board. Mawby evaluated the work of the Fellows in their studies and programs, and made recommendations for changes that would make programs more beneficial for the students.

March 15-16, 1965- Chicago, Illinois

Meeting with the President of West Virginia University, Dr. Paul A. Miller, to discuss the success of the ICA's (Institute of Colombian Agriculture) efforts in Colombia, changes in salary, increased management and staffing to stabilize working conditions, additional schools and classes on agriculture for people going into the workforce, and establishing a headquarters where the government could work with the community.

March 18, 1965- Michigan State University

Meeting with Dr. L. L. Boger and discuss the Mass Management Educational Program, the proposal on farm leadership, the general programs of the Division, and how the progress was related to the involvement of the Kellogg Foundation

March 22-25, 1965- University of Missouri

Meeting with Dr. Brice Ratchford, the Dean for the Extension Division of the University of Missouri, to explain the Foundation and the purpose of the Advisory Committee. Mawby met with the 4-H Club and their Directors, and Dr. Margaret Mangel, the Director of the School of Home Economics. They talked about the importance of funding the development of home economics. Mawby also discussed the problems with poverty and unemployment among rural populations in South Dakota with Dr. John Stone, the Director of Extension in South Dakota.

April 5-8, 1965- Ames and Iowa City, Iowa

Meeting with Dr. Helen LeBaron, Dean of the College of Home Economics at Iowa State University to discuss the Foundation and its goals. They discussed proposals by Dr. LeBaron for programs for the school, and how the Foundation could aid programs in Iowa. Mawby also spoke with C.J. Gauger about the changes that the 4-H Club was making in Iowa to better benefit youth and youth programs.

April 19-22, 1965- Colorado and Nebraska

Meeting with Mr. Hugo Stuckenschneider, the News Editor of The Record Stockman in Denver to discuss the economy and agriculture of the Plains and Mountain States, and how changes in

the climate were affecting agriculture. He also met with Dr. Glen Dildine, Dr. Charles E. Ramsey and Manuel Alers-Montalvo to discuss funding for the Human Relations Laboratory. Mawby also spoke with Dr. Dildine about the need to educate workers in the area of agriculture. Mawby spoke about plans for the Latin American area studies program and how the Foundation could work into those plans.

April 26-29, 1965- Washington, D.C.

Trip to speak at the National 4-H Conference, "Youth in the Universe of Education." Mawby met to see how programs were working and becoming more effective. He also explained the Foundation and its focus in helping the community, and explained how the Foundation could help the 4-H Club. Mawby met with ECOP, a group that was aiding youth from rural areas. He spoke with Dr. Hal Barker and Dr. Keith Justice of the National Association of Colleges and Teachers of Agriculture about their efforts to improve the teaching of agriculture, especially in undergraduate programs.

May 4, 1965- Chicago, Illinois

Trip to plan the workshop for the youth leaders of the Lutheran church, Church in Town and Country Division of the National Lutheran Council. The National Lutheran Council brought together the leaders of youth groups to find ways to aid rural youth who participated in the church.

May 6, 1965- Michigan State University

Meeting with Dean Cowden to discuss the problems of food shortages in different countries, and what should be done to help feed those in need. Dean Cowden proposed a plan for chemists to look at human nutrition, and find ways to get nutrition to those in need. They also discussed the importance of effective communication in the agricultural college graduates, and improvements to the curriculum that would ensure the skills needed once they graduated. Mawby also met with Dr. David Boyne, of the Department of Agricultural Economics to discuss a budget proposal for a program dealing with farm leadership.

May 9-16, 1965- California

Meeting with Foundation Fellows to evaluate their studies and speak with advisors about their progress with agricultural programs, and with Dean E. Gorton Linsley, the Dean of the College of Agriculture at UC Berkeley and Davis. He met with Dr. Michele de Benedictis to talk about the joint program between the Department of Agricultural Economics at Berkeley and the University of Naples that had been funded by the Ford Foundation since 1959. The program looked at how to address problems with agriculture in Italy. Mawby also met with Dr. Rudy O. Monosmith, the State 4-H Leader with the Agricultural Extension Service, about Mawby's work with 4-H and also how the programs have been changing.

May 26-28, 1965- New York City, New York

Trip to participate in the meeting of the Rockefeller Foundation and review the Development Report of the Institute of Colombian Agriculture. They discussed the budget and the assistance that the program would need.

June 22, 1965- Michigan State University

Meeting with Dr. Garland Wood and Dr. Harold Hiley of the Department of Agricultural Economics, and Dr. Kirk Lawton, Director of the International Programs in the College of Agriculture. They discussed programs that were being implemented in Colombia, mainly the project of the Institute of Colombian Agriculture. They went over weaknesses of the project, and worked on solutions to make it more beneficial in the future.

June 30, 1965- University of Florida

Visit with Dr. E. T. York Jr., Provost of the Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences of the University of Florida. Mawby discussed the Center for Tropical Agriculture at the University of Florida and the types of services it provided for the students in the program. The future of the program was also discussed, along with changes that should be made in the curriculum to best suit the needs of the students.

July 7-8, 1965- Washington, D.C.

Trip to attend a conference with the Office of Education of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, the National Education Association, the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges, and the Federal Extension Services. Mawby discussed the success of the National Association of Colleges and Teachers of Agriculture, the problems in rural areas and schools, and how they could meet the needs of the youth in rural areas.

July 12-23, 1965- Colombia

Trip to become acquainted with Colombia and its agriculture, along with the organization of ICA, and to meet with the faculty of the Agriculture and Research Stations at Palmira, Medellin and Bogota. The progress of the organization was tracked, and plans were made as to how the Kellogg Foundation would be able to help the ICA.

July 29-30, 1965- Sawyer, Michigan and Chicago, Illinois

Meeting with Dr. T. W. Schultz and review the progress of the previous meeting. They discussed the African American Land-Grant Institutions and also on the National Land-Grant Universities Association and their programs. These notes include an attachment from T. W. Schultz entitled "Farm People: the Individual, the Family and the Community." Mawby also met with Dr. Robert Clark and Dr. Sydney Staniforth of the National Agricultural Extension Center for Advanced Study to talk about the contributions made by the Kellogg Foundation, and also changes that were being made to the Center.

August 2-4, 1965- South Dakota

Trip to attend the first International Conference of Extension Leaders at South Dakota State University. Mawby was a speaker at the conference, and also spent time with the other speakers to discuss their views about the conference and their programs.

August 6, 1965- Michigan State University

Meeting with Dr. Robert Kramer to discuss the program at California State Polytechnic University and to talk about Dr. Kramer's trip to Europe. They discussed the education that students receive in Europe and how the curriculum should be changed for the agricultural economics program.

September 13- October 14, 1965 (Extra set of notes from Ireland Oct. 7-11)- Europe: Finland, Sweden, Norway, Denmark, The Netherlands, Germany, England (2), Scotland, Ireland, Northern Ireland.

Trip to visit ten areas that were receiving support from the Foundation, and also to visit with the Fellows to assess their progress.

October 26-29, 1965- Kentucky

Meeting with Dr. Morris to see the progress of the Eastern Kentucky Resource Development Project, specifically the Wood Utilization Center from a joint program with the Prestonsburg

Community College.

November 15-17, 1965- Minneapolis, Minnesota

Trip to participate in the 79th Annual Convention of the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges and also to discuss progress of programs funded by the Foundation. Included is a report entitled "Report of Special Task Force on Work with Youth of Low-Income Families in Rural Areas."

November 28-29, 1965- Washington, D.C.

Trip to represent Kellogg at a meeting for Foundation executives with the U.S. Office of Education. Topics focused on new programs in education and how these programs affected the Foundations. Information on the meeting and a list of participants is included.

December 1-3, 1965- South Dakota State University

Meeting with faculty members at South Dakota State University and discuss the problems with rural communities, especially those with low populations, and to attend the Annual Conference of the South Dakota Cooperative Extension Service. At the meeting with the faculty, Mawby discussed low enrollment in schools, lack of education among the teachers, and the inadequate curriculum in many schools. At the conference, they discussed the future of South Dakota and programs that would be implemented to aid the state.

December 21-22, 1965- University of Nebraska

Meeting with Chancellor Hardin, Dean Frolik and other members of their team about their trip to Colombia, and the proposed Division of Information and Development. They also spent time looking at programs already in place, and see how the Division would fit with these.

January 10-13, 1966- Tuskegee, Alabama and Atlanta, Georgia

Trip to Tuskegee Institute to follow up on a meeting with Dr. Grady Taylor. There was also a visit to the Foundation offices and to the current programs at the school. In Atlanta, there was a meeting with Dr. William Bowden of the Southern Regional Education Board for Mawby to get acquainted with the program.

January 21-27, 1966- Florida

Trip to the University of Florida, the Florida A & M University and to the Junior College of Broward County. At the University of Florida, Mawby acquainted himself with the Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences, and considered the work done in agriculture and community college leadership. At Florida A & M, Mawby met with Dr. Perry to see the campus and to discuss how the Foundation could put more emphasis and aid into public institutions to help minorities in higher education. At the Junior College of Broward County, Mawby was able to see the progress that the college had made, but also discussed the problems that the college was facing due to low enrollment.

February 1-2, 1966- Madison, Wisconsin

Trip to the University of Wisconsin to discuss the future plans of the National Agricultural Extension Center for Advanced Study, and to also to meet with the Fellows in the program and follow their progress.

February 24-25, 1966- Washington, D.C.

Trip to the American Association of Junior Colleges, the Federal Extension Service, the U. S. Office of Education and the National Education Association. During these meetings they discussed the progress that the junior colleges were making in their own programs and also what they plan to do in the future to better their curriculum. While meeting with the Extension Committee, they discussed the programs created to help rural youth.

March 8-10, 1966- Alabama and Tennessee

Trip to Alabama A & M to discuss the support that the school has gotten from the state, and how that support helped the school with improvements to the curriculum and how state funds would not cover those costs in the future. In Tennessee, Mawby met with the Executive Committee of the Council of Southern Universities and representatives from the African American institutions. They discussed changes and improvements to universities and colleges that were mainly African American in the South.

March 18, 1966- Michigan State University

Meeting with Dr. L. L. Boger and Mr. John C. Doneth to discuss TELFARM and its future in the farming business. They talked about how useful the product was and how many farmers they thought were going to be using TELFARM in the future.

March 22-25, 1966- Arkansas and Mississippi

Trip to Mississippi State University, Alcorn A & M College, and Arkansas Agricultural, Mechanical and Normal College. While in Mississippi, Mawby met with Dr. William L. Giles, President D. W. Colvard, and Dr. Louis Wise. They discussed changes to the programs at the colleges including adding a graduate program in agriculture to go along with the undergraduate programs. They also discussed the importance of the education of the African Americans in the South, and how it should have more of an emphasis. Diversity was a priority, and they discussed needed a more diverse group of students getting an education in those areas. At Arkansas, Mawby met with Dr. Lawrence A. Davis to discuss the doctorate programs at Alcorn A & M, and the enrollment in these programs. They also discussed the importance of diversity, the progress of the African American students who were getting their Ph. D's, and the problems the school was having with their programs due to insufficient staffing.

April 5-7, 1966- Georgia

Trip to the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools in Atlanta, the Fort Valley State College, and the Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College. The purpose of these visits was to gather information on African American Land-Grant institutions for the Kellogg Foundation. The Foundation was looking into what needed to be done to strengthen the educational system at these colleges and universities.

April 12-13, 1966- University of Nebraska

Trip to the Institute of Colombian Agriculture and the University of Nebraska to discuss their proposal to the ICA for the support of the Foundation in the Division of Information and Development. The Foundation also discussed the possibility of a collaboration with the Kellogg Foundation, the Ford Foundation and the Rockefeller Foundation to work together on a program for the Fellowship.

April 19-22, 1966- North Carolina and Washington, D.C.

Trip to A & T College of North Carolina and North Carolina State University to discuss the progress of the Fellows. There were also meetings with the National 4-H Club, the Federal Extension Service, and the Foreign Training Division of the USDA.

April 24-27, 1966- California State Polytechnic University

Trip to the Arabian Advisory Committee of the Kellogg Unit of California Polytechnic University and with President McPhee and Vice President Kramer to discuss the Kellogg Campus. They discussed the future of the horse program at the school, and also the future of the campus itself.

May 4-5, 1966- Atlanta, Georgia

Meeting with Dr. John E. Codwell, Dr. Donald Agnew, Dr. Gordon Sweet and Dr. J. Curtis Dixon to discuss the predominantly African American Land-Grant institutions. They talked about the problems with the institutions and what should be done to help fix these problems and to strengthen the schools, their curriculum, and the staff.

June 5-6, 1966- Minnesota

Trip to participate in a seminar on "Agricultural Education in Minnesota." Mawby discussed the idea of technical education in agriculture and how junior colleges, the University College of Agriculture, the State Department of Public Education, and technical schools are meeting with each other to plan the technical programs that they want to implement for agriculture.

June 14-17, 1966- Fort Collins Colorado

Trip to Colorado State University to meet with the Departments of Economics and Sociology-Anthropology, and with the subcommittees of 4-H to discuss their proposal.

September 15, 1966- Michigan State University

Meeting with Dean Cowden, Dr. L. L. Boger and also David Boyne to discuss multiple proposals that Dean Cowden had for the Foundation. Mawby also discussed the Farmer's Study Program and the progress that it was making with the students who were involved.

September 20- October 8, 1966- Europe: England, Germany, Ireland

Trip to England, Germany, Ireland and Northern Ireland to discuss programs that are of interest to the Foundation.

October 17-19, 1966- New York City, New York

Trip to attend the conference "The Population Crisis: Twentieth Century Challenge," sponsored by Planned Parenthood. Mawby discussed different problem areas around the world and what should be done to try and increase food production and nutrition in areas where it is needed.

October 24-26, 1966- Montana State University

Trip to Montana State University to discuss a plan for a Northern Plains Center for Economic Development regarding changes to their Extension Services and problems in the community dealing with agriculture and economics.

November 17, 1966- Michigan State University

Trip to Michigan State University for a meeting with representatives from the apple industry to discuss the problems in the industry including organization, cooperation, and communication. Mawby provided an outside opinion to shed light on these problems.

January 5-6, 1967- Washington, D.C.

Meeting with Dr. Paul A. Miller to discuss the plans for Continuing Education Book #2.

January 11-12, 1967- New York City, New York

Meeting with Mr. H. Bruce Palmer, President of the National Industrial Conference Board to discuss the Board and their interests in Public Affairs. Mr. Palmer described the Board and its

interests in their future work with public affairs.

January 17, 1967- Michigan State University

Meeting with Dr. James T. Bonnen, Dr. L. L. Boger, Dale Hathaway and Amalie Vasold to discuss the progress of all of the MSU programs, and to update the Foundation.

January 23- February 3, 1967- Latin America: Guatemala, Costa Rica, Colombia

Trip to three countries to visit the programs that the Foundation supported, see their progress, and discuss any problems or changes.

February 13-14, 1967- Iowa State University

Meeting at Iowa State University to see the progress of the Iowa State Center, and to speak with officials from the Center for Agricultural and Economic Development about rising costs of the new building. The officials for the Center for Agricultural and Economic Development presented a proposal for the Foundation to continue its support.

March 3, 1967- Michigan State University

Trip to follow up on Fellow Damian Hannah and his progress and accomplishments after he had completed the program and returned to Ireland.

March 30- April 3, 1967- Florida

Meeting with Dr. Hugh Popenoe to discuss the progress made in the Latin American programs, and to the International Center for Tropical Agriculture at Cali. He also met with E. T. York to discuss the International Center, and Florida A & M to see how the Center would strengthen the programs there.

April 12, 1967- Michigan State University

Meeting at Michigan State with Dr. Vern Sorenson of the Department of Agricultural Economics to discuss the problems in Europe, and what types of agricultural programs could be implemented. Mawby met with Dean Cowden to talk about University involvement in Argentina and Latin America.

April 17-21, 1967- California

Meetings at Cal Poly with the Fellows in the Foundation's program. There was also a meeting with officials of the college to talk about the proposal for the Continuing Education Center, and about the future of the program at the Center that would best suit their needs in higher education. Mawby met with the Arabian Advisory Committee to discuss the changes in the committee since the last time he had been there. The last meeting was with the University of California to talk about the proposed study of Agricultural Education in California.

May 24, 1967- Lansing, Michigan

Trip to participate in the Citizens Advisory Committee and discuss the Michigan School Financial Study that was being funded by the state.

May 24-25, 1967- Washington, D.C.

Meeting with other foundation representatives to discuss new programs, developments, and changes in the Office of Education. They also discussed the "Jobs for Foundations" presented by Dr. Alex Lude.

September 18- October 6, 1967- Europe: Norway, Denmark, Finland, Sweden, Germany, Ireland

(Two copies of notes from Ireland)

Meeting with officials in Norway, Denmark, Finland, Sweden, Germany and Ireland to see the programs that were funded by the Foundation and to discuss proposals.

October 23-25, 1967- California

Trip to the University of Southern California and California State Polytechnic University to follow up on two proposals; one for the Continuing Education Center and another for the public affairs program. There was also a meeting with the Arabian Advisory Committee and the inauguration of President Kramer at Cal Poly.

October 25-27, 1967- New York City, New York

Trip to participate in a meeting with Dr. Paul A. Miller of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare and discuss the CLSEA. They talked about proposals for future plans of the CLSEA, and the possibility of support from the Foundation. There was also a meeting with the Rockefeller Foundation to find out the progress and future plans of the International Center for Tropical Agriculture in Colombia (CIAT).

November 6-7, 1967- University of Missouri

Trip to attend the Conference of Extension Youth Agents to discuss ideas and changes for the program to make it more effective. The officials discussed the possibility of involving the Extension program of the University of Missouri in their own program because they had similar programs in that area for youth. There was also a meeting with Dr. Mary Nell Greenwood to discuss the Extension Program for Women and the progress that they were making in home economics and family life.

April 1-3, 1968- New York City, New York

Trip to participate in the Rockefeller Foundation Symposium on Strategy for the Conquest of Hunger. Participants included representatives from all over the world who were working in programs of the Rockefeller Foundation. The main purpose of the symposium was to promote the work that the Rockefeller Foundation had done in many developing countries.

April 16-23, 1968- Bogota, Colombia

Trip to Colombia to see the progress of the ICA Program in Extension and to discuss the proposal from the Institute of Colombian Agriculture (ICA) for more assistance from the Foundation. There was also a meeting to discuss the plans that the CIAT had for the involvement of the Foundation, and interviews with potential candidates for the ICA.

May 13-17, 1968, University of Alaska

Trip to the University of Alaska to assess the progress of a program to domesticate the musk ox. Mawby discussed the successes and problems of the program. He spoke with faculty and became better acquainted with the school in general.

May 29, 1968- New York City, New York

During this trip there was a meeting with members of the Ford Foundation and the Rockefeller Foundation to discuss the International Center for Tropical Agriculture. The meeting was to help show the foundations the plans for the center and how the foundations would be involved with each other on the start of the CIAT.

June 27- July 2, 1968- Bogota, Colombia

Meeting with the Ford Foundation and the Rockefeller Foundation to discuss the ICA and the CIAT. The Board of Trustees from CIAT met with the foundations to discuss their proposals to

the foundations. They discussed possible fellows for the program, and visited the ICA to see the progress of the program.

October 3-4, 1968- New York City, New York

Meeting with the Ford Foundation, Rockefeller Foundation, and CIAT to discuss the budget proposal for CIAT and plans to see the progress of CIAT before starting the program.

October 8-10, 1968- Washington, D.C. (Two copies of notes)

Meeting with the National Academy of Sciences to discuss improving the connection between the Agricultural Board and the Board of International Agriculture for better international programming in agriculture and nutrition. Mawby met with the National 4-H Club Foundation to discuss funding the expansion of the club. He also met with the Foreign Training Division of the International Agricultural Development Service of the USDA to discuss Fellows who were being considered for the Foundation.

October 31- November 3, 1968- Harriman, New York

Visit to attend the American Assembly on World Hunger, Thirty-Fourth American Assembly at Arden House "Overcoming World Hunger." Participants were from a diverse background of jobs including government, education, business and industry.

November 19-21, 1968- Ithaca, New York

Meeting with Dr. J. Paul Leagans to discuss the progress of the Fellows. Mawby met with the Fellows, and attended a meeting at the College of Agriculture to discuss proposals they had for a future project called the Organization Development Project. He also met with the International Agriculture Development staff to discuss possible support for their projects.

February 17-26, 1969- Latin America: Bogota, Colombia

Meeting with the CIAT board to discuss the progress of programs in Colombia. Potential Fellows were interviewed.

April 21- May 9, 1969- Europe: Norway, Sweden, Finland, Denmark, Ireland

Trips to Norway, Sweden, Finland, Denmark and Ireland to meet with officials of programs supported by the Foundation.

May 27- June 1, 1969- Colombia (Two copies of notes)

Meeting with officials from the Institute of Colombian Agriculture to help set up their program, hire faculty, and select Fellows. There was also a meeting with CIAT to visit programs and answer questions.

October 28, 1969- New York City, New York (Two copies of notes)

Attendance at CIAT Budget Hearings held at the Rockefeller Foundation to discuss the budget for CIAT. The Ford Foundation was also present with the Kellogg Foundation and the Rockefeller Foundation. They discussed building plans and how the budget would be divided between each Foundation.

October 29, 1969- Claremont, California

Meeting at Claremont Men's College to meet with President H. R. Neville and discuss the proposal for a Public Affairs Athenaeum to help the undergraduate programs at the college.

October 30-31, 1969- California State Polytechnic University (Two copies of notes)

Visit to Cal Poly to see the progress of construction on the campus, and discuss the budget for

the school. Mawby also visited the Arabian Advisory Committee to see the progress of the Arabian program and to tour working farms throughout California.

November 10-11, 1969- Chicago, Illinois (Two copies of notes)

Attendance at the NASULGC Annual Meeting and meeting with Dr. Patrick Boyle from the University of Wisconsin about the program and Fellows at University College in Dublin. They discussed problems with the faculty, and the success of the students. Mawby spoke at the NASULGC meeting entitled "The Critics: Legislatures, the Congress, and the Big Foundations." He also met to discuss a proposal from the University of Wisconsin on their expansion of the University Extension program and the graduate program for the National University Extension Center.

December 2-4, 1969- Washington, D.C.

Trip to the White House Conference on Food, Nutrition and Health to share ideas for government welfare programs.

February 5-6, 1970- University of Missouri (Two copies of notes)

Trip to discuss a proposal from the University of Missouri to expand their 4-H program into St. Louis. Along with this expansion they wanted to break up certain parts of their operation so that there would be more focus in each area and involve the University with the program to expand the support and effectiveness of the 4-H program.

March 2-4, 1970- Colombia

Meeting with officials of the ICA and also with the Social Science Department to discuss the curriculum of the program, and future support by Kellogg. There were also interviews for potential ICA Fellows. Mawby also visited other extension programs to see farm projects.

July 13-19, 1970- Colombia (Two copies of notes)

Trip to discuss the grant proposal from the ICA, evaluate the progress on the ICA project, and review potential Fellows. Mawby met with the Board of Directors of CIAT (meeting is covered in another set of notes). During the meeting they discussed the problems and solutions for the programs, and discussed the success of CIAT.

May 31, 1972- CIAT

Trip to CIAT to evaluate the progress of the construction on the classrooms and offices. Mawby also participated in the Board Meeting. They discussed the budget and what was still needed to complete the CIAT project with the WKKF, the Rockefeller Foundation and the Kresge Foundation funding.

June 1-2, 1972- Bogota, Colombia

Trip to the University of Nebraska Mission and with officials from the ICA. They discussed the future plans of creating a graduate program at the ICA in Colombia rather than send students to the U.S.

March 20- April 8, 1973- Australia (Two copies of notes)

Trip to discuss the curriculum of health and nursing programs in Australia and of using a program at the University of New South Wales as a model. After visiting the University, they traveled around other parts of Australia to see other university programs supported by the Foundation.

April 26-27, 1973- California State Polytechnic University
Trip to the Kellogg-Voorhis Campus to meet with the Arabian Advisory Committee about the construction and budget of the new building.

June 26, 1973- University of Missouri-Columbia
Trip to the University of Missouri-Columbia to discuss a proposal from the University for a program involving community youth and the expansion of 4-H into Greater St. Louis.

October 11-12, 1973- Cali, Colombia
Trip to participate in the Board of Trustees meeting of the CIAT and view the progress of their programs and construction of facilities needed for CIAT.

Trip to Medellin, Cali, and Bogota to see the progress with projects in the health and medical field and participate in Board meetings of CIAT. There were also trips to the medical, dental, and nursing schools to visit students in the programs.

Meeting with the Norwegian Minister of Agriculture and the Agricultural College. Mawby visited projects sites and agricultural programs supported by the Foundation. There was also a meeting with King Olaf V to discuss the agricultural issues in Norway.

The conference focused on the quality of life in Washington and types of programs that could be implemented to improve life for the citizens of Washington. The PRI also proposed a budget to the Foundation for their future support.

April 21- May 1, 1980- Ireland
Trip to the National University of Ireland to receive an honorary degree for the work that he and the Foundation have done. Other meetings were with the Royal Dublin Society, the Irish Countrywomen's Association, the An Grianan Finance Committee, and the ICA to review programs and proposals for future aid by the Foundation.

March 1984- June 1989- Itineraries
