Presidential Studies Mourning the Presidents: Loss and Legacy in American Culture February 20 | 6 pm | Charles W. Loosemore Auditorium

The death of a chief executive, regardless of the circumstances, is always a moment of reckoning and reflection. *Mourning the Presidents* offers a unique approach to understanding American culture and politics by uncovering parallels between different generations of mourners, highlighting distinct experiences, and examining what presidential deaths can tell us about societal fissures at various critical points in the nation's history, right up to the present moment. Author and historian Matthew Costello examines how different generations and communities of Americans have eulogized and remembered U.S. presidents since George Washington's death in 1799.



Common Ground Initiative **Progressive / Conservative Summit: Constitutional Reform with Jeffrey Rosen**February 29 | L.V. Eberhard Center

In 1787, fifty-five Americans gathered in Philadelphia for the Constitutional Convention, drafting the document that would act as the supreme law of the United States: the Constitution. The Constitution has since been amended 27 times by generations of Americans seeking to achieve "a more perfect union." Today, progressives and conservatives agree that additional change is needed in our country, but disagree on individual reforms. Thinkers from both sides increasingly advocate the use of constitutional reform to address policy issues such as healthcare, election systems, and more. Join the Common Ground Initiative and Jeffrey Rosen, CEO of the National Constitution Center for this half day event to explore the future of constitutional reform and learn how we can walk in the footsteps of the founders.

Presidential Studies King Hancock: The Radical Influence of a Moderate Founding Father March 14 | 6 pm | Charles W. Loosemore Auditorium

Best known for his famous signature, John Hancock is often overshadowed by many of his colleagues in the founding of our nation. With middle-of-the-road and often shifting political views, how did John Hancock become an influential figure amid a radical time and place? Historian and author Brooke Barbier provides a spirited account of John Hancock's life, tracing a moment when passion was on the side of compromise and accommodation proved the basis of profound social and political change.
