M.D. in Family Medicine (2006)

Ebony Parker-Featherstone is a 2002 graduate of Grand Valley State University where she earned *cum laude* honors. She went on to earn her medical degree from the University of Michigan Medical School in 2006, and she completed her residency training with the Department of Family Medicine at the University of Michigan Health System in 2009. Ebony completed a women's health fellowship with the University of Michigan, Department of Obstetrics in 2010. Her research interests are in adolescent health and family planning, and she has published multiple research papers in this area. Ebony is the current medical director at Briarwood Family Medicine, where she provides the full spectrum of family medicine including prenatal and obstetric care. She also has joint appointments with the Department of Family Medicine and the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology at the University of Michigan as a clinical assistant professor. She now lives in Ann Arbor with her husband, Freddie Featherstone (GVSU class of 2001), and their two children Aiden and Addisyn.

Jillian Foerster

Jillian Foerster received her B.S. in 2009 from Grand Valley in Cell and Molecular Biology. She continued her education at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, where she earned her Ph.D. in 2013 in Plant Breeding and Plant Genetics by studying the genetic structure and agronomic importance of vegetative phase change in maize. Jillian is currently a research scientist at DuPont Pioneer in Des Moines, Iowa within the Plant Breeding, Product Development, and Breeding Technologies departments. In this role she helps develop and optimize field and molecular breeding strategies for soybean product development. In 2015, her team won the Best Innovation award, and in 2016, she received the Productivity of the Year award.

At Grand Valley she proudly served as President of the Geography Club, performed in the production of Antona Garcia at the Siglo de Oro Drama Festival in El Paso, organized community cleanup service projects, and completed numerous internships. After graduation, Amanda was awarded a fulltime internship with the City of Grand Rapid's Development Center. She was offered fulltime employment working with the Community Engagement Division of the Planning Department in September of 2014 where she was responsible for development and implementation of the Community Engagement Plan for the four million dollar road construction projects performed each year. She also managed implementation of a digital solution for City Boards and Commissions and worked on communication improvements for Code Compliance notifications. Ph.D. in Mathematics Education (2012)

Samuel Otten graduated from GVSU in 2006 with a B.S. in Mathematics and Minor in Psychology. In addition to completing the requirements for secondary teaching certification in mathematics, Samuel completed undergraduate research projects in pure mathematics, which eventually led to three publications in refereed journals. He received numerous honors, including the 2006 Outstanding Graduate Award in Mathematics.

Sam went on to earn his M.S. in Mathematics and Ph.D. in Mathematics Education from Michigan State University, where his dissertation focused on the connections between curricula and student learning theory in the middle school algebra classroom. Sam accepted a tenure-track position of Assistant Professor of Mathematics Education at the University of Missouri. There, he has authored and/or coauthored over 30 research articles in his field, given over 25 presentations at the national and international levels, and secured funding through several research grants. He teaches a variety of courses, supervises future teachers, and has been nominated for both the Excellence in Advising and Undergraduate Instructor of the Year Awards.

Some of his recent projects include New York Times best seller DO OVER: Rescue Monday, Reinvent Your Work, and Never Get Stuck by Jon Acuff and For the Love: Fighting for Grace in a World of Impossible Standards by Jen Hatmaker, which debuted #2 on the New York Times best sellers list.

Before joining Yates & Yates, Mike began his career at Zondervan as an intern for ZonderKidz. His internship led to a position on the trade book marketing team, where he developed and implemented marketing plans for books like *Cold Tangerines, Sacred Marriage*, and *New York Times* best seller *One Thousand Gifts*. In 2011, he accepted a position with David C. Cook in Colorado Springs, CO, and spent three and a half years marketing books, including best-selling books from author Francis Chan. Mike received his degree from Grand Valley State University in 2006 as a double major in Professional Writing and Communications.

Along with representing authors, Mike has had his fiction appear in Black Warrior Review, Crab Orchard Review, and Midwestern Gothic, among others. In 2012, Grand Valley's Summer Film Project made his short story, Horizontal Accidents, into a film. Mike is a graduate of the MFA program at Pacific University. Ryan Shorey

B.S. in Psychology (2008)* Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology (2014)

Ryan C. Shorey is an Assistant Professor of Psychology (Clinical) at Ohio University. He received his B.S. in Psychology from Grand Valley in 2008 and his Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology from the University of Tennessee, Knoxville in 2014. He completed his pre-doctoral internship at the Charleston Consortium (Medical University of South Carolina/ Ralph H. Johnson VAMC). Ryan's research program examines intimate partner violence, particularly violence between dating college couples. He focuses heavily on evaluating and testing theoretical models of dating violence in an effort to gain a clearer understanding of how to develop prevention and intervention programs aimed at reducing these harmful behaviors. Ryan's current line of research includes (1) examining longitudinal predictors of intimate partner violence, (2) assessing genetic and phenotypic moderators of the temporal association between alcohol and intimate partner violence perpetration, and (3) developing intervention and prevention programs for intimate partner violence and sexual assault, including interventions designed to reduce substance use and increase adaptive emotion regulation. Ryan's research has been supported by the National Institute of Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism and the American Psychological Foundation.

Littisha Bates

B.S. in Sociology (2004)* Ph.D. in Sociology (2009)*

Littisha Bates received her Ph.D. and M.A. in Sociology from Arizona State University and her B.A. in Sociology from Grand Valley State University. At Arizona State University she was trained as a Quantitative Family Demographer in CePoD (Center for Population Dynamics). Her research interests include: education, family, demography and social stratification.

Littisha's current research examines racial/ethnic differences in educational outcomes. In particular, her current projects focus on moving beyond the status quo white/black comparison to include a number of racial/ethnic groups. In addition to considering a number of

B.S. in Physics and Mathematics (2009)* Ph.D. in Applied Physics (2015)

Paige Kelley earned dual B.S. degrees in Physics and Mathematics from Grand Valley State University in 2009. During her time at GVSU, Paige gained a wealth of undergraduate research experience on topics ranging from semiconductor physics to surface science that inspired her to pursue a research career. Paige attended GVSU on a Presidential Scholarship and received the 2009 Glenn A. Niemeyer and Physics Department senior awards. Following a year of service in the AmeriCorps VISTA anti-poverty program, she accepted a Presidential Doctoral Fellowship at the University of South Florida and conducted her Ph.D. research on strongly correlated low-dimensional magnetic oxide systems.

She currently holds a joint postdoctoral research position at the University of Tennessee and Oak Ridge National Laboratory, participating in a Moore Foundation EPiQS initiative to study emergent phenomena in novel quantum materials. Paige has co-authored over 20 scientific journal articles and collaborated with scientists around the world, including time spent as a guest researcher at the NIST Center for Neutron Research and the Institute of Physics in Kosice, Slovakia. Her current research interests include the study of frustrated and noncentrosymmetric magnetism through a combination of novel single crystal growth and neutron scattering techniques.
