French-Secondary Education emphasis (39 credits)

A 2.7 cumulative GPA in the French major is required for admission to the College of Education

Prerequisites: C (not C-) or better in FRE 301, 304, 306, and 307 or permission of instructor

*FRE 355 will count towards one elective if the Literature or Civilization emphasis is chosen

Study Abroad: French majors interested in teacher certification are required to study abroad for at least one semester (12-15 credits at the 300-level) in a French-language study abroad program. Program must be approved prior to study abroad by a faculty advisor in French and can be used to fulfill major requirement courses. This is applicable for students who start fall 2014 and later. Students who are unable to complete the study abroad requirement will need to complete an alternative plan approved by a French faculty advisor. Please meet with a French faculty advisor as soon as possible to discuss your options.

Prerequisites for FRE 355, 308 and 310: C (not C-) or better in FRE 301, 304, 306, and 307 or permission of instructor

Prerequisites: C (not C-) or better in FRE 202 and one other course at the 300-level or permission of instructor

Recommended: ENG 261 (Foundations of Language Study), ENG 363 (Applied Linguistics), and ENG 364 (Sociolinguistics)

Students will not need to take WRT 150 if they have earned credit for the course through AP/Dual Enrollment. A grade of C or better is required in WRT 150 in order to satisfy the WRT 150 requirement at GVSU.

²EDF 100 is an exploratory elective for students uncertain about pursuing teacher certification. It can be taken in either the fall or winter semester.

Guide for Declaring the Secondary Education Majors and Minor

1. Log into myBanner from the GVSU homepage
2. Once logged in select "Student", "Student Records", and then, "Change Major"
3. Click on the "Change Major 1/Program" box
4. Click on the down arrow in the box next to "New Major 1/Program," from here scroll down and choose "French-BA-Secondary Education"
5. Click "Submit." The system will automatically declare your 2nd major in "Education" and give you the option to declare a minor. Choose an appropriate minor from the list and then click "Change to New Program"
