- Goodwill offers Certified Nurse Aide (CNA) training. The program is four weeks, Monday-Friday; they offer at least three courses each summer. The CNA program includes 115 hours of training in theory, laboratory, and clinical work.
- Goodwill works with graduates of their training to find employment. And they stay in contact with their graduates for 1 year after completion. There are 8 classes with about 12 students in each class. It runs 8:30-3 M-F for 4 weeks with a clinical rotation. You must get 100% on skill demonstration for certification.
- Cost is \$1800 and includes supplies and the certification exam fee. A portion of the costs could be reimbursed through employment at an agency that accepts Medicare or other federal aid. Goodwill offers one full scholarship per course and one partial scholarship per course.
These scholarships are awarded to individuals who demonstrate financial need as well as motivation to succeed and excellent work habits.

- Mary Free Bed provides “Career Seminars” which allow students to learn about different rehab-related careers, including Physical Therapy (PT), Occupational Therapy (OT), Speech-Language Pathology (SLP), and Recreational Therapy. These Career Seminars lead to job shadowing opportunities (students must attend a Career Seminar before they are allowed to shadow).
- There are volunteer opportunities available to college students at Mary Free Bed, which allow up to 30-40 hours of volunteer work. Students will have the opportunity to observe therapists (PT, OT or SLP), and maintain the cleanliness of therapy areas. - Mary Free Bed has paid entry-level jobs for CNAs, Rehabilitation Techs, and patient escorts. Their Nurse Tech positions do not require prior certification. They have internships but they are mostly unpaid. Mary Free Bed does offer to reimburse or pay for CNA training.
- Mary Free Bed also offers both minority and disability scholarship programs, which could provide qualified students with \$1000 to \$10,000 in scholarship awards. To be eligible for the minority scholarship, students must be admitted or currently enrolled in a full time program such as Nursing, PT, OT, SLP, Therapeutic Rec, or Neuropsychology. - Porter Hills has various volunteer opportunities available at their retirement communities which are continuous positions. These positions could involve being a Friendly Visitor, which is someone who provides social enrichment to the residents.
- There are mostly day hours but they do run three 12 hour shifts/day. Flex positions are available.
- Postings are updated every Friday. They encourage you to submit a cover letter with your application.
- They also have paid positions that are more hands-on, such as Resident Assistants (which require no prior certification) or CNAs. For more information, visit www.porterhills.org/jobs

- To be competitive for positions at Porter Hills, it's helpful to have experience in geriatrics (i.e. caring for a sick relative), ability to work on your feet, and good computer skills.

GVSU Scribe Academy

- GVSU has partnered with Helix Scribe Solutions to provide the GVSU Scribe Academy. The program is designed to train individuals to assist healthcare providers in local Emergency Departments (ED) by documenting patient care in the electronic medical record. Students enrolled in the program are trained in the classroom, online, and in the ED.
 - Students who successfully complete the program will be hired as hourly employees of Emergency Care Specialists and will work at a Spectrum Health hospital location such as Butterworth, Blodgett, or Helen DeVos Children's Hospital. Might be adding locations in Reed City and Greenville. Scribes must be able to work at least two 8 hour shifts/week.
- As a medical scribe you'll witness a multitude of patient cases every day – from sprained ankles to life-threatening injuries – giving you unparalleled clinical exposure to take with you to medical, nursing or PA school.
- **To apply for a scribe position, visit www.gvsu.edu/scribe**
 - The scribe academy is going to a rolling admissions training program due to demand. Students will have the ability to work at their own pace through training and get done in as little as 4 weeks although typically it will take about 6 weeks to complete training.
 - Requirements to apply include: 2.50 minimum GPA, at least sophomore standing, the ability to type >50 WPM and lift up to 15 lbs. A background check, drug screening, and immunizations are also required.
- To be competitive for a scribe position, it helps to:
 - Be pursuing a health degree
 - Be familiar with medical terminology
 - Have an ability to multi task and work effectively in a fast-paced environment
 - Be confident and have good communication skills
- Scribe positions are a great gap year activity; scribes can become managers and work full time at a higher rate of pay. Training is free and there is an online screening process.
