Undergraduate Research Scholar Designation

- **Exemplary GVSU Undergraduate students who have pursued research or creative projects are eligible to receive a designation of “Undergraduate Research Scholar” or “Undergraduate Creative Scholar” on their OFFICIAL transcript, beginning Winter Semester 2014.** The goal of the GVSU Undergraduate Research Scholar designation is to foster and deepen undergraduate research at GVSU, while recognizing student excellence in undergraduate research and inquiry. The program recognizes that exemplary student scholarship encompasses a depth of knowledge in the discipline, strong skills of inquiry, an understanding of research ethics, and strong skills in writing and presentation.

Application Requirements:

- **Applicant must have completed a minimum of two semesters of research, scholarship, or creative activity supervised by a tenured, or tenure track faculty mentor.** Applicant needs to have a signed letter from the supervising faculty member indicating when the student participated, and the responsibilities/activities of the student during this time. (Please note that Spring/Summer is considered one semester).
- **Applicant must have disseminated research or scholarship through a recognized, on campus venue such as Student Scholars Day, Scholar Summer Showcase, or departmental presentations.** Both citation and abstract are required.
- **Applicant must have disseminated peer-reviewed research or scholarship through a state, regional, or national conference, and/or juried artistic venue, such as an art exhibition, concert or festival; or, publish (or have accepted for publication) applicant’s research or creative project in a refereed [peer-reviewed] research or professional journal.** Both citation and abstract are required.
- **Applicant must include a letter of recommendation from a faculty mentor that explains why the applicant’s research and scholarship is beyond that of a typical student.**
- **An up-to-date CV or résumé.**
- **Applicant must include a research/scholarship statement describing applicant’s scholarship path and contributions.** This statement should be no less than 1,000 words.

How Do Students Apply?

Each potential scholar will need to submit all materials in one packet, or pdf document to the Office of Undergraduate Research and Scholarship (OURS). Please note the list of needed documentation for the transcript notation below:

- **Request for Scholar Designation Application**
- **Letter(s) from faculty supervisor(s) indicating semesters of research and the responsibilities/activities of the student**
- **Letter of endorsement from a faculty mentor**
- **Citation and abstract of an on campus presentation**
- **Citation and abstract of an off campus presentation or publication**
- **CV or Résumé**
- **Research/Scholarship statement**

Additional information about the supporting materials can be found on the Request for Scholar Designation Application which can be downloaded from www.gvsu.edu/ours. Designation requests can be submitted up to four weeks before graduation. You may also submit the application any time after you have completed all of the requirements. **Please note the corresponding semesters of graduation and designation request dates:**

- **Winter 2014 semester: apply by March 20, 2014**
- **Spring/Summer 2014 semester: apply by July 20, 2014**
- **Fall 2014 semester: apply by November 20, 2014**

OURS will verify that the student has completed all of the requirements listed on the application. If confirmed, OURS will submit the student's name and appropriate designation to the Registrar who will enter the notation on the transcript. Students will be informed within thirty days of application.



Summer Opportunities

- **Research Experience for Undergraduates (REU) summer fellowship is open at the Marine Science Institute, University of California Santa Barbara.** The duration of this program is 12 weeks, June 3-Aug 29, although these dates can be somewhat flexible to accommodate academic schedules. The fellow will be involved with an **NSF-funded project** on the use of **particulate organic matter by marine suspension feeders**, and will do a project likely focused on some aspect of **trophic relationships in kelp forests off the California coast**. The student will learn ecological and biochemical methods to explore this topic, and will be **required to write a report, in the format of a scientific paper, and give a presentation on their project** at the end of the summer. **Travel costs to and from UCSB will be covered, and the student will be provided with a \$500/week stipend for living expenses.** This is an intensive full-time commitment and any work or educational activities outside the program must be approved. You are eligible if you are an **undergraduate** student who has completed at **least two years of study** towards a bachelor's degree, and you will still be an undergraduate in the fall after the summer program. Students from underrepresented groups and institutions with limited research opportunities are especially encouraged to apply. Experience with scientific diving is desirable but not required. Applicants must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents of the U.S. and its possessions. Interested applicants should send a



- statement of interest
- resume
- unofficial transcript
- one letter of recommendation, and
- contact information for one additional reference.

The statement of interest should be less than 500 words and include the following information:

- professional goals
- interest in position, and
- relevant experience.

Send application materials, preferably in one PDF or Word file, to Robert Miller (miller@msi.ucsb.edu) **by April 15, 2014**. You may also send all application materials in hard copy by mail to:

The letter of recommendation should be sent directly from the recommender (please include the applicants name in the subject line for emails). Incomplete applications will not be considered.
