MD/PhD Training in the NIH MD/PhD Intramural Partnership Training Program

This innovative program allows MD/PhD students to obtain all or part of their research training in one of the more than one thousand biomedical research laboratories in the NIH intramural research program and maintain eligibility for MSTP-funding if admitted to many of the MD/PhD programs around the country. The program web site, which is new this year is at <http://mdphd.gpp.nih.gov>

For most students in this program, the Ph.D. is obtained from one of NIH's graduate partnership Ph.D. Programs. The NIH Oxford-Cambridge Scholars Ph.D. Program <http://oxcam.gpp.nih.gov> has been particularly popular among students pursuing MD/PhD training at NIH. This accelerated doctoral program allows students to set up dual-mentored Ph.D. research projects involving laboratories at NIH and at either Oxford or Cambridge Universities in England. This program is also compatible with holders of Rhodes, Marshall, Gates or other international scholarships to study in the U.K. Other Ph.D. programs that fit well for MD/PhD students are listed on their web site. The program has grown considerably, and they now have sixty MD/PhD students who are doing research at NIH in partnership with thirty medical schools across the country. Approximately forty of these students are in the NIH Oxford-Cambridge scholars program. Graduates have gone on to top residencies at institutions such as New York Hospital/Cornell Medical Center and Children's Hospital in Boston. While students are on campus for their research, they have arranged for longitudinal preceptorships in the clinical center, the nation's largest and most advanced research hospital.

If you are applying to MD/PhD program for Fall 2011 admission you should apply for NIH Ph.D. training in parallel with your current applications to medical schools. Interested students should read the information for prospective students on their website <http://mdphd.gpp.nih.gov/prospectiveStudents/prospectiveStudents.asp> including an important listing of which medical school MSTP programs participate in the NIH partnership. Applications are accepted through the NIH GPP application portal at <https://gpp-nih.symplicity.com/> with no application fee.

Applicants not currently enrolled in medical school should select track 1 of the NIH MD/PhD partnership training program in addition to their choice of Ph.D. program. The program web site explains the different training tracks supported by this program. This year's application deadline is **January 3, 2011**.

The Van Andel Research Institute

The Van Andel Institute Graduate School (VAIGS) provides an innovative Ph.D. program for students with the capacity and motivation for careers in biomedical research. The Van Andel Research Institute, located in Grand Rapids, Michigan, conducts biomedical research with an emphasis on translating scientific results into clinical applications. VAIGS trains Ph.D. scientists to be leading scholars in cellular, molecular and genetic studies relevant to human diseases. Their innovative problem-based curriculum leads students to explore fundamental concepts in genetics, biochemistry, cell and molecular biology, and bioinformatics through highly integrated courses based on current research questions. Graduate students conduct their dissertation research in state-of-the-art laboratories within a beautiful, award-winning building. Other components of the program help develop the professional skills needed in future research leaders.

For the entering class of Fall 2011, they seek effective independent learners who work capably in a collegial team environment. A solid foundation in cell biology, molecular biology and genetics will be important, but they believe the understanding of and passion for the life of a scientist is most critical for applicants. Those with a bold and pioneering spirit will make the most of this opportunity.

MD/PhD Programs of The University of Texas Health Science Center

On Friday, January 14, 2011, the MD/PhD Programs of The University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston's Medical School, M. D. Anderson Cancer Center, and Baylor College of Medicine will host a special (no cost) Translational Research Symposium and an MD/PhD Career Development Workshop on January 15. The Symposium is designed to illustrate how state-of-the-art basic science research is conducted and rapidly translated to improve clinical and public health outcomes. It may be of special interest to undergraduates interested in MD/PhD programs who are considering a PhD in the biomedical sciences that involves dissertation research with a clear potential for a clinical or translational impact. The Workshop has been specifically designed for current and prospective MD/PhD students. Both the Symposium and Workshop are open to the public and there is no charge to attend, but visiting students must register by December 31, 2010 to attend the Workshop. Travel funds (includes transportation, 1-2 nights of lodging and meal allowance) are available for prospective MD/PhD students to attend the symposium and workshop. Summer Undergraduate Research Program at the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine

Summer undergraduate research program provides stimulating and rewarding research opportunities for undergraduates considering graduate education in biomedical research. Students admitted to the program conduct an independent research project under the guidance of a faculty member in one of seven programs. Funding includes a \$3,500 stipend for the 10-week program, plus \$500 for transportation and FREE campus housing. You may apply if you are a rising sophomore or rising junior enrolled in a regionally accredited college or university in the US. International students are eligible to apply if currently in F1 or J1 visa status. Individuals from groups

Interdisciplinary Research Experiences for Undergraduates in the Structure and Function of Proteins at the University of Michigan

Student participants will be engaged in an intensive 10 week period of hands-on experimental training and independent investigation in the areas of biochemistry, biophysics, cheminformatics, computational chemistry, enzymology, marine biology, molecular biology and plant biology. The research projects featured in this program all involve studies of the structure and function of proteins. In addition to the research experience, students will participate in a series of weekly enrichment seminars focusing on scientific communication, graduate school admissions and scientific career options. Rising juniors and seniors majoring in biochemistry, biology, biophysics, chemistry, computer science, engineering (chemical/biomedical), mathematics or a related discipline will be eligible for participation in the program. Applications are available online at: <http://pharmacy.umich.edu/reu>. Application deadline is **February 15, 2011**. The program dates are June 6-August 12, 2011. Participants will receive at \$4500 stipend, on campus housing, a \$1000 meal allowance and a \$300 travel allowance. You must be a US Citizen or Permanent Resident to apply. 4. Scholarship Opportunities

The Barry M. Goldwater Scholarship

The Barry M. Goldwater Scholarship (<http://www.act.org/goldwater/index.html>) provides up to \$7,500 per year for educational expenses to sophomores and juniors who intend to pursue careers in mathematics, the natural sciences, or engineering. The Goldwater Foundation seeks students in mathematics or the sciences, who display intellectual curiosity and intensity; and possess potential for significant future contributions in their chosen field. Candidates are expected to pursue doctoral degrees. Students who plan to study medicine are eligible for a Goldwater Scholarship only if they plan a research career rather than a career as a medical doctor in private practice. Sophomores awarded the scholarship receive two years of support; juniors receive one year of support. **Applicants must have a minimum GPA of 3.60 to be considered for the Campus Selection procedure.**

How To Apply:

***Supporting Documents are to be submitted directly to the GVSU Office of Fellowships, 120 Niemeyer Hall by Thursday, January 13, 2011.**

Supporting documents include:

- *Nominee essay-written by the student and relates to the student's chosen career.
- *Transcript from nominee's current institution, including fall semester
- *Transcript(s) from other institutions, that nominee attended with grades for courses taken.
- *Secondary school transcript (these can be requested from your high school)
- *Documentation for home school in lieu of secondary school transcript, if applicable.
- *Copy of the nominee's Permanent Resident card and letter of intent to become U.S. citizen, if nominee's citizenship status is permanent resident (this is only necessary should you receive UNC's nomination)

The Elie Wiesel Prize in Ethics Essay Contest 2011

The Elie Wiesel Prize in Ethics Essay Contest 2011 is accepting submissions from students across the U.S. through December 6, 2010. The first prize winner will receive a \$5,000 cash prize. As part of the submission of materials, students must submit a completed entry form signed by both the student and faculty sponsor and a letter from the Registrar's Office (on school stationary, verifying eligibility). The James "Rhio" O'Connor Memorial Scholarship Fund is offering its scholarship again this year. It is an essay contest open to all college students. The essay subject concerns cancer and the scholarships are \$5,000 for first place, \$2,000 for second place, and \$1,000 for third place. Whitaker International Fellows and Scholars Program

The Whitaker International Program is a competitive grant that sends emerging leaders in biomedical engineering (or bioengineering) overseas to increase international collaboration in the field. The Whitaker Program was funded by The Whitaker Foundation (now closed), and is administered by the Institute of International Education.

Whitaker International Program grants are awarded based on an activity/project proposal that is relevant to biomedical engineering. They hope to offer about 50 grants annually, but only the highest-quality applicants are awarded. In the last three competitions, 15, 20 and 35 grants have been awarded.

They are looking for at least 150 qualified applications this year, so all students who are even thinking of this type of option are encouraged to apply.

Awards have included research in heart blood flow, improved prosthetic leg design, and development of affordable oral cancer screening tools. Projects occur worldwide, including the UK, Chile, Denmark, India, South Africa, and many more.

Types of Grants

The Whitaker International Program has two categories

- * Fellows - Graduate-level applicants, from graduating seniors through current PhD students. Fellows receive a stipend for one year, and are eligible for tuition reimbursement.
- * Scholars - Post-doctoral applicants, who recently received their PhD. Scholar awards can be for as little as one academic semester or as long as two years of funding, depending on their needs. Second year funding is contingent upon demonstration of progress made during the first year.

5. Global Health and Volunteer Opportunities

Pre-Med Opportunity in India

Any undergraduate student that is interested in international community health should know about the Mabelle Arole Fellowship, awarded annually since 2002 through JSI Research and Training, Inc. Candidates must be admitted to medical school to be eligible. If awarded the Fellowship, they defer entrance to medical school for one year.

Applications are due in mid-January 2011 and finalists are interviewed in mid-March at American Medical Student Association conference in Washington, DC. The Fellow departs US in late August and returns in early summer of 2012. The Fellow, who receives \$8,000 to cover all expenses, spends 10 months at the Comprehensive Rural Health Project at Jamkhed (in Maharashtra), one of the best examples of how mobilized/empowered communities can

significantly improve their health/nutrition status.
