1. Helpful Information for First-Year Students

1. Be sure to stay on track in your classes. It is much easier to establish and maintain a solid GPA then to rebuild it after a tough semester or two. The average GPA of a student entering a M.D program is a 3.65. Utilize the resources on campus. Visit the tutoring website at <http://www.gvsu.edu/tc/> to get more information.
2. Attend class, take notes, do assigned homework and keep up with class readings. This seems simple enough, but it is very easy to fall behind. Be sure to talk with your professor regarding any concerns or problems you may be facing in your classes.

Call our office (the CLAS Academic Advising Center) at (616) 331-8585 to do so. It is very important to be on the right track as you embark on your journey as an undergraduate. Setting up an appointment will give you insight on what will be expected of you, what your options are and the application process for different paths.
4. Be sure to eat healthy and do not skip meals. It is easy to be writing a paper, only to realize it has been 4 hours and you missed dinner. Along with this, do your best to get appropriate amounts of sleep and exercise. This will be beneficial both for success in class and staying healthy. If you are living in the dorms, keep a bottle of hand sanitizer at your desk and use it regularly.
5. Allow time for extra-curriculars. They are important. Find the pre-professional group that is of interest to you. Also, find something that is of interest to you outside of your major and future goals. It is

important to take a break from studying and academics, whether it is through exercise and sports, a social organization, religious organization or service and advocacy groups. They all can be beneficial in some way and will compliment your educational experiences. (Don't over-book yourself. Manage your time and you will be successful!)

MD/PhD Training in the NIH MD/PhD Intramural Partnership Training Program

This innovative program allows MD/PhD students to obtain all or part of their research training in one of the more than one thousand biomedical research laboratories in the NIH intramural research program and maintain eligibility for MSTP-funding if admitted to many of the MD/PhD programs around the country. The program web site, which new this year is at <http://mdphd.gpp.nih.gov> For most students in this program, the Ph.D. is obtained from one of NIH's graduate partnership Ph.D. Programs. The NIH Oxford-Cambridge Scholars Ph.D. Program <http://oxcam.gpp.nih.gov> has been particularly popular among students pursuing MD/PhD training at NIH. This accelerated doctoral program allows students to set up dual-mentored Ph.D. research projects involving laboratories at NIH and at either Oxford or Cambridge Universities in England. This program is also compatible with holders of Rhodes, Marshall, Gates or other international scholarships to study in the U.K. Other Ph.D. programs that fit well for MD/PhD students are listed on their web site. The program has grown considerably, and they now have sixty MD/PhD students who are doing research at NIH in partnership with thirty medical schools across the country. Approximately forty of these students are in the NIH Oxford-Cambridge scholars program. Graduates have gone on to top residencies at institutions such as New York Hospital/Cornell Medical Center and Children's Hospital in Boston. While students are on campus for their research, they have arranged for longitudinal preceptorships in the clinical center, the nation's largest and most advanced research hospital.

If you are applying to MD/PhD program for Fall 2011 admission you should apply for NIH Ph.D. training in parallel with your current applications to medical schools. Interested students should read the information for prospective students on their website

<http://mdphd.gpp.nih.gov/prospectiveStudents/prospectiveStudents.asp> including an important listing of which medical school MSTP programs participate in the NIH partnership. Applications are accepted through the NIH GPP application portal at <https://gpp-nih.symlicity.com/> with no application fee. Applicants not currently enrolled in medical school should select track 1 of the NIH MD/PhD partnership training program in addition to their choice of Ph.D. program. The program web site explains the different training tracks supported by this program. This year's application deadline is **January 3, 2011**.

James "Rhio" O'Connor Memorial Scholarship

The James "Rhio" O'Connor Memorial Scholarship Fund is offering its scholarship again this year. It is an essay contest open to all college students. The essay subject concerns cancer and the scholarships are \$5,000 for first place, \$2,000 for second place, and \$1,000 for third place. Whitaker International Fellows and Scholars Program

The Whitaker International Program is a competitive grant that sends emerging leaders in biomedical engineering (or bioengineering) overseas to increase international collaboration in the field. The Whitaker Program was funded by The Whitaker Foundation (now closed), and is administered by the Institute of International Education.

Whitaker International Program grants are awarded based on an activity/project proposal that is relevant to biomedical engineering. We hope to offer about 50 grants annually, but only the highest-quality applicants are awarded. In the last three competitions, 15, 20 and 35 grants have been awarded.

We are looking for at least 150 qualified applications this year, so all students who are even thinking of this type of option are encouraged to apply.

Awards have included research in heart blood flow, improved prosthetic leg design, and development of affordable oral cancer screening tools. Projects occur worldwide, including the UK, Chile, Denmark, India, South Africa, and many more.

Types of Grants

The Whitaker International Program has two categories

- * Fellows - Graduate-level applicants, from graduating seniors through current PhD students. Fellows receive a stipend for one year, and are eligible for tuition reimbursement.
- * Scholars - Post-doctoral applicants, who recently received their PhD. Scholar awards can be for as little as one academic semester or as long as two years of funding, depending on their needs. Second year funding is contingent upon demonstration of progress made during the first year.

Mission

Global Health Corps (GHC) aims to mobilize a global community of young leaders to build a movement for health equity.

The Problem

The extreme disparity in health outcomes and access to healthcare that exists today between the world's rich and the world's poor is unjust and unsustainable. These global health challenges are embedded in a diverse set of social, political and economic contexts that require strong leadership and innovative approaches. The complexity and scope of these challenges necessitate participation from a wide range of fields beyond medicine. Individuals with skills from supply chain management to computer programming to monitoring and evaluation will be essential in remedying the unacceptable inequity of today.

Opportunities for individuals with backgrounds outside of medicine to use their unique skills in public health are scarce. Too many skilled and ambitious young professionals are unaware of or unable to achieve their potential impact in the health field, prolonging the creation and implementation of innovative solutions.

GHC Vision

GHC believes that a global movement of individuals and organizations fighting for improved health outcomes and access to healthcare for the poor is necessary in order to change the unacceptable status quo of extreme inequity. GHC works to build this movement by recruiting, training, and supporting the movement's future leaders and by diversifying the pool of young people working in global health.

GHC provides opportunities for young professionals from diverse backgrounds to work on the frontlines of the fight for global health equity in year-long fellowships. Their fellows will have a measurable impact on the health of the communities in which they work, and draw upon that experience and the GHC alumni network, to deepen their impact throughout their careers.

GHC will create a pipeline of young leaders for the global health equity movement, and at scale will play a central role in sustaining and consistently reinvigorating this movement for change. This infusion of young, passionate, skilled leaders will help to tip the balance towards a more equitable and just global distribution of health services.

Students receive supervised hands-on experience, health related seminars, and financial sponsorship.
