
#### **Know Your Scholarships**

With the mountain of students applying to college each year, many colleges like to give priority (in terms of selection and scholarship availability) to those who apply to their school early. ## Senior Timeline

Your senior year will come and go more quickly than you might expect. Make sure you have everything in order early. Make your transition from high school senior to college freshman will be an easy one.

#### September

Create a personal essay (for college and scholarship applications)

Write a Résumé for college applications

Begin applying to colleges (at least 3)

Meet with your counselor

Have your social security number memorized

Sign up for the October ACT: September 19 and write down all of your passwords

#### October

Continue applying for colleges (at least 3)

Make sure that your counselor knows where to submit your transcript and ACT scores (Your application is not complete until your counselor sends these items!)

Turn in applications with Nov. 1 Deadline

Attend the Aquinas College Fair (October 23; 12:00 – 2:00; 6:30-8:00)

#### November

College Application Week (Nov. 3-7)

Turn in applications with a December 1 deadline

Meet with college reps, they might be able to take your application on the spot

Ask teachers and counselors for letters of recommendation

Begin researching scholarships

Sign up for the December ACT: November 7

#### December

Finish essays for scholarships

Have teachers and counselors look over your essays and résumé

Make sure that you have applied to all the colleges and scholarships of your choice before the holiday break

# **Know Your Scholarships**

Scholarships are a necessary part of affording college tuition. Whereas student loans must be paid back (with interest), scholarships do not have to be paid back.

Below you will find a list of popular scholarships that TRiO Educational Talent Search students have applied for (and received).

- Tuition Incentive Program: for students who have received Medicaid for 24 consecutive months within three years of applying.
  - Pays for \$250/semester at a 2-year college
  - \$500 for 4 semesters at a 4-year college
- Michigan Experience Scholarship: A University of Michigan Scholarship for TRiO students.
  - o \$10,000/year for 4 years
- Early Awareness Scholarship: A GVSU scholarships for students with (at least) a 3.3 GPA and a 21 on the ACT.
  - \$3,000/year for 4 years
- Gates-Millennium Scholarship: Students go through a rigorous process writing 8 essays, creating a résumé, and gathering letters of recommendation.
  - Worth 10 years of college tuition
  - O Due January 14, 2015
- MI-CAPP Academic Achievement Award: Students with a 3.00 or higher can apply. The student must be active in TRiO.
  - o Worth \$500
  - o Due in late November

- MI-CAPP Academic Progress
   Award: Students with a GPA
   between 2.00 and 2.99 can apply.
   The student must be active in TRiO.
  - o Worth \$500
  - Due in late November
- Grand Rapids Community
   Foundation Scholarships:
   Deadlines, amounts, and qualifications vary by school. One application that applies students for all qualifying scholarships.
  - Opens on January 1
- Michigan Competitive
   Scholarship: A scholarship for
   students with at least a 2.0 and
   planning to go to a two-year or
   four-year college.
  - o \$575; renewable
  - o Due March 1
- Arts Council of Greater Grand Rapids Minority Scholarship: For students of color (African American, Asian, Hispanic, Native American, Pacific Islander) with at least a 2.5 GPA and interested in pursuing an arts degree.
  - Amounts vary
  - o Due April 1

- Address your college plans with your TRIO Advisor.
- 2. Keep track of all of your deadlines for colleges and financial aid.
- 3. Work hard at applying for scholarships. Ask your TRIO Advisor and school counselor for scholarship leads.
- 4. Keep on working in your classes to get the best grades possible.

- 5. Become familiar with your college choices.
- 6. Keep track of your mail, email, and college information.
- Make a point to see your TRIO Advisor regarding college applications and applying for financial aid.
- 8. Politely remind your counselor to send your transcript and ACT info to schools to which you have applied.
