

## **Cultures: Global Perspectives**

These courses are meant to help students understand the perspectives and ways of life of people in societies located outside the United States. Courses in this designation provide students with a basis for understanding and interpreting the variety of world cultures, institutions, societies, and challenges (e.g., discrimination, racism, inequality, environmental issues, poverty).

## **Knowledge Student Learning Outcomes**

Student will:

- 1. Explain how culture affects people's efforts to understand, use, and survive in their environments, and how these efforts, in turn, affect culture.
- 2. Explain within a cultural context the worldviews, language, or ways of life of societies, nations, regions, or peoples located outside of the United States.

## Skills Student Learning Outcome 1 (choose one of the following):

Graduates are proficient in:

- a) Critical Thinking: Comprehensively evaluate issues, ideas, artifacts, or events before forming a conclusion; or
- b) Information Literacy: Identify the need for information; access, evaluate, and use information effectively, ethically, and legally.

## Skills Student Learning Outcome 2 (choose one of the following):

Graduates are proficient in:

- a) Collaboration: Effectively work on a team {Students must participate in a group project conducted over a significant portion of the semester}; or
- b) Oral Communication: Effectively prepare and deliver a formal oral presentation. {Students must give individual formal presentations; group presentations are acceptable if every student presents}
