

DEVELOPING A NEW INTERNATIONAL PARTNERSHIP



In celebration of the '100,000 Strong in the Americas' campaign, led by the Governments of Mexico and the United States, the 2014 International Partnership Delegation will visit our long-standing exchange partner, Universidad de las Américas – Puebla (UDLAP) in Mexico. UDLAP is one of Mexico's most prestigious private universities with Schools of Arts and Humanities, Social Sciences, Sciences, Engineering, Business and Economics.

UDLAP is located in the municipality of San Andrés Cholula, which is fifteen minutes from the city of Puebla. Founded in 1531, Puebla brings together the influences of pre-Hispanic, colonial, and modern Mexico.

PARTNERSHIP DELEGATION GRANT

APPLICATION DEADLINE: November 1, 2013 ELIGIBILITY: GVSU Faculty, AP Staff and COT Staff

The International Partnership Delegation Grant provides the opportunity to travel to one of GVSU's partner institutions as part of a small group of colleagues. A GVSU faculty member with expertise in the destination country and culture, as well as a representative from the Padnos International Center, will lead the group. Transportation, housing, and most meals are covered for recipients of this award. The 2014 group will travel to Universidad de las Américas in Mexico.

FACULTY/STAFF EXCHANGE PROGRAM

APPLICATION DEADLINES: October 1, 2013 (For travel completed by October 2014) ELIGIBILITY: Tenured, tenure-track, and full-time affiliate faculty with five years at GVSU, AP, COT, and maintenance staff

The Faculty/Staff Exchange Program is designed to significantly deepen or broaden GVSU's comprehensive partnerships with select overseas institutions, this program is aimed at helping units and individuals realize existing internationalization goals. In particular, this program is an avenue to bring appropriate individuals from partner institutions here to the GVSU campuses so that our community can learn from them; the program supports reciprocal travel by appropriate individuals to visit the partner institutions, too. Grant awards are meant to provide enough funds for one individual to travel in each direction, but units or colleges may add additional funds for additional travelers.

INTERNATIONALIZATION GRANT

APPLICATION DEADLINES: October 1, 2013 and February 1, 2014

ELIGIBILITY: Tenured, tenure-track and full-time affiliate faculty with five years at GVSU

The Internationalization Grant is meant to support specific internationalization goals in particular academic programs, in development of dual- or joint- degree schemes, curriculum integration projects, or new courses that feature global learning outcomes. An essential element of this grant is that the recipient integrates the skills/knowledge they acquired during their experience back into the GVSU campus community upon their return. The grants are not aimed at supporting participation in academic conferences. Awards up to \$3000 per project.

PARTNERSHIP DEVELOPMENT GRANT

Applications are considered on a rolling basis.

ELIGIBILITY: GVSU Departments (Individual faculty and staff members are not eligible to apply for this grant)

The Partnership Development Grant is available to departments interested in furthering the development of an existing or new international partnership. Funding is limited and is intended to provide assistance for initiatives that are due to take place in the first year of a new project. We encourage departments to explore how GVSU's international partnerships can enrich the offerings and activities within their respective area and how a partnership development grant could help meet the department's goals. Preference will be given to projects in which the unit or college commits matching funds.

PARTNERSHIP SUSTENANCE GRANT

Applications are considered on a rolling basis.

ELIGIBILITY: GVSU Faculty (Conditions apply, see below for details)

The Partnership Sustenance Grant has been developed to support faculty that have been involved with a partner institution for many years and have made significant contributions to the development of the partnership. The grant offers funding for short-term exchange opportunities that focus on nurturing relationships and sustaining program activities.

PONDICHERRY UNIVERSITY FACULTY EXCHANGE GRANT

This grant is not available for 2013-14.

ELIGIBILITY: Tenured, tenure-track, and full-time affiliate faculty

One competitive grant per year is provided to support a GVSU faculty member to serve as a guest instructor at Pondicherry University for one to sixteen weeks. Pondicherry University is in southeastern India.

TEACHING ABROAD

The Padnos International Center strongly encourages faculty to seek teaching opportunities abroad, especially as part of their sabbatical leaves. Not only does teaching in another culture and in an overseas university structure provide you with valuable insight, but you will have opportunities to work with counterparts in your field. These experiences then enhance and internationalize your teaching and research at GVSU after your return. Most often, the best method is to use contacts you develop yourself.

GVSU has partnerships or other agreements with over thirty institutions globally, and these partnerships foster an environment of reciprocity and exchange. They might be potential destinations due to established connections. You will be primarily responsible for making contacts and gaining an invitation from the host institution.

Each year 2 or more GVSU faculty have been successful in securing Fulbright awards; you may be the next.

QUICK FACTS

- Students can participate in 3 types of study abroad programs: Faculty-Led, Partnership or Non-GVSU
- International internship opportunities are available
- · Students can study abroad during fall, winter or summer semesters or for the full academic year
- 2.5 GPA (Undergraduates) and 3.0 GPA (Graduates) required
- · Students are able to meet major, minor and General Education requirements while abroad
- Study abroad applicants must have completed one semester here at GVSU before applying
- Students do not have to be bilingual to study abroad
- Financial aid, scholarships and grants can help cover the cost of study abroad
- · There are about 15 programs that may save students money when compared to the cost of a semester at GVSU

ADVISING STUDENTS ON STUDY ABROAD

Academic advisers play an influential role in guiding students through their college careers. While PIC consistently sends a message to our students that study abroad is an important part of their educational plan, we recognize that a unified voice from the campus community will enhance this message. Academic advisers can use the following checklist to help advocate for and advise on study abroad.

CHECKLIST FOR STUDY ABROAD ADVISING

- Have you considered studying abroad?
- Have you attended a Study Abroad First Step Meeting?
- Do you know where PIC is located?
- Are you going to attend the Study Abroad Fair?
- Did you know financial aid, scholarships and grants can be used to help cover the cost of a study abroad?
- Let's discuss program options relevant to your degree plan.
- Have you thought about how study abroad could enhance your academic/professional goals?
- Let's review your MyPath and highlight credits that can be taken abroad.
- Let's determine how the credits you take abroad will transfer.

Your department can support study abroad students by having a discussion about how credits taken abroad will transfer, creating a major/minor advising sheet (see details on next page) or by requesting a presentation on study abroad for your department, classroom or student organization.

DEVELOPING A STUDY ABROAD MAJOR/MINOR ADVISING SHEET

Academic departments and PIC collaborate to create advising resources for degree programs in order to assist students, as well as academic advisers, faculty and study abroad professionals. Our goal is to create a resource that can ultimately be used to help students identify a set of ideal study abroad programs in which they can continue to advance towards their degree at GVSU by taking courses in their major or minor.



INTERNATIONAL STUDENT OVERVIEW



GVSU International Students 2012

The Fall 2012 semester, GVSU enrolled 369 international students from 80 different countries. While there are many students on GVSU's campus that have international backgrounds, the only students that are actually categorized as international are those on F1 or J1 visas, their primary purpose is to study in the United States, and they are sponsored for their immigration status by Grand Valley. These students must meet GVSU's academic standards as well as provide proof of English ability at the university level (generally by taking the TOEFL test). Of the 369 international students enrolled, more than 75% are seeking full time degrees at GVSU.

WRITING SUPPORT

Writing Center - The Fred Meijer Center for Writing offers excellent support to all students at GVSU, and they offer additional support to international students and students for whom English is a second language. International and ESL students may schedule a standing weekly appointment with a trained writing consultant. All students, international and ESL writers included, may schedule one-time appointments, visit during drop-in hours, and use the center's online services.

Citations - In many countries, practices surrounding the idea of intellectual property are significantly different from those in the United States. This often leads to difficulty for international students, especially in correctly citing sources. Plagiarism and intellectual property are topics covered during the mandatory international student orientation. However, the information during orientation is presented during most students' first week in the United States, and while the students have been exposed to the ideas, they probably have many questions and concerns that require follow-up. It is helpful if faculty state in their syllabi which method of citation (APA, MLA, etc.) is preferred. International students will benefit from discussing expectations regarding when and how to cite information from other writers. Additionally, it is helpful to direct students to purchase the appropriate style guide and to encourage the students to use the Writing Center. By appointment, students can work with Writing Center consultants to use SafeAssign to double-check instances of unintentional plagiarism.

Writing Samples · If appropriate, it is helpful to international students to see an example of a high quality assignment. Many times, international students turn to each other for assistance, and submit papers or assignments that would be appropriate in their home country, but have missed the mark in our system. If they are provided an example, many times, that helps them to change their initial approach, and leads to a much more positive experience.

LANGUAGE SUPPORT

International students have all had their language ability tested prior to being admitted. Sometimes students' ability to perform well can still be inhibited by their English skills. International students may take ESL 098 and WRT 098 as courses to improve their skills, although those classes do not count towards graduation, so many are reluctant to enroll in them. Encourage international students to join Toastmasters to work on their speaking skills and to use the Writing Center to work on their writing skills.

Adaptive Technology - Much of the adaptive technology that is available to students with disabilities is now being used to help second language learners so that they can focus on learning rather than keeping up during class. Two of the technologies that are particularly impressive for international students are: LiveScribe and WynnWizard. Students can be referred to Disability Support Services at: 200 Student Services building, 331-2490.

CLASSROOM AIDS

Notes on Blackboard - If appropriate, international students appreciate having the lecture notes or outline prior to class. This helps them follow the lecture and course material.


Organized Study Groups - International students frequently seek each other out to study together. While PIC spends time in orientation discussing the fact that diverse viewpoints in study groups are helpful, international students don't always know how to best approach domestic students to either begin or join a study group. Having faculty facilitate some sort of study group is helpful to international students and takes the pressure off of them.

Office Hours - International students are encouraged at orientation to visit each faculty member at least once a semester during office hours. Most international students do not come from an academic background where faculty are available for questions, discussions, or clarifications. Many professors find that international students open up and have questions focusing on difficulties with money, cultural transitions, locating grocery stores, etc. If you have a student with questions that you either do not know the answer to, or feel that the questions are not appropriate to be addressed to you, please feel free to refer them back to the Padnos International Center, 130 Lake Ontario Hall, 331-3898.

Professional Journals and Organizations - International students are probably familiar with international professional journals and organizations, but they can benefit from knowing the national, regional and local resources available to students in any particular major. If that information is available in the syllabus or course website, international students will use it. Frequently, they look outside of the course for information on acceptable styles, vocabulary, definitions, as well as trends in the field, conferences and career opportunities.

Academically Focused Student Organizations - This is particularly helpful for international students transitioning to US Culture. Participation offers an easy segue into meeting domestic students, potential friends, and certainly classmates. International students also have the same opportunities as domestic students to serve in leadership roles within student organizations. The disadvantage for international students is that many come from academic environments that did not include such a vast array of student organizations, so they may not even know that they exist.
