GRADUATION HONORS

The cords, stoles, sashes, and flags of different colors worn by some of the graduates are part of a special commencement tradition. They represent honors distinctions and recognize academic excellence or achievements in leadership. Some of the honors are based on grade point averages; other honors involve meritorious scholarship in fields of study or notable work for a particular organization.

Whether the distinction comes as part of a national honor society or is specific to Grand Valley — such as graduating from the Frederik Meijer Honors College — the colors of the garb have special meanings. Garb awarded by national academic organizations are generally the color attributed to a particular discipline. Those awarded by the university and nonacademic organizations generally represent a level of achievement and are unique to the university.

All of the garb signifies the students' dedication and hard work during their time at GVSU — attributes that will, no doubt, play a significant role in their future as well.

For the spring 2021 graduates who may qualify for the honors distinction once final grades are posted, the designation of "honors candidates" has been granted.

Honors will be awarded as follows: Summa cum laude — 4.00 Magna cum laude — 3.898-3.999 Cum laude — 3.809-3.897
