

Above is a blank plat that may be used to represent a county, a township, four sections, or one section according to the requirements of a precise location for the site. In any case named or numbered roads can be drawn in. If the county subdivisions are not used it should be so stated.

One of the four directions must be indicated.

When a site is measured to a cross-roads that is too far away to be shown on this plat, a line of dashes (----), with the distance indicated, can show the direction in which the cross-roads lie .
