Zero Waste Football Games





Together, we diverted a total of 93% of waste from landfills at the game.

The exhibit, titled *Open [Everything]*, explores ways in which Open Educational Resources, Open Access, and Open Research Practices are lowering barriers to learning, improving equity, and driving innovation. Visitors are invited to consider how they might respond to real scenarios facing researchers and educators and will learn how they can take action to support Open knowledge.
