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Speakers for commencement ceremonies named

More than 3,000 students will participate in commencement ceremonies April 27 and 28 at Van Andel Arena in downtown Grand Rapids.

The ceremonies will take place at 7 p.m. on Friday, April 27, and at 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. on Saturday, April 28. Raymond Bennett, a Grand

Valley alumnus and chief global officer for Marriott International Inc., is the speaker for the Friday ceremony. The morning speaker on Saturday is U.S. Sen. Gary Peters, who has represented Michigan in the U.S. Senate since 2014.

Chemistry professor earns top educator honors

Deborah Herrington, professor and interim chair of chemistry, has been named one of the top educators in the State of Michigan by the Michigan Association of State Universities.

Herrington was one of three educators who received the Michigan Distinguished Professor of the Year Award during a ceremony on April 20 in Lansing.

Herrington is the co-founder and current director of Target Inquiry, a program that contributes toward improving the professional development of middle and high school science teachers while helping them create student-centered and inquiry-based classroom environments. Classroom materials developed by Target Inquiry have been downloaded by teachers in more than 40 countries.

She also leads the Retaining and Inspiring Students in Science and Engineering program, which financially assists academically talented, low-income undergraduate students seeking an education in science or engineering. RISE will create a set of progressively increasing four-year scholarships for at least 50 Grand Valley students who may not otherwise be able to afford a college education.

The program came to fruition after Herrington and her team received a \$1 million grant from the National Science Foundation's Scholarships in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics program in December.

Throughout her tenure at Grand Valley, Herrington has been the recipient of multiple awards, including the Glenn A. Niemeyer Award in 2014, which is the highest faculty honor at Grand Valley.

Couple increases scholarships to working families

Hundreds of students at Grand Valley will get a financial boost thanks to the generosity of a Detroit area couple and their foundation.

Bob and Ellen Thompson are increasing their investment in student success by expanding the Thompson Working Family Scholarship Program. This program is aimed at helping students who come from families who, despite

working hard, cannot fund a child's college education.

They began the Thompson Working Family Scholarship Program (TWFS) at Grand Valley in 2011 with 15 students receiving \$3,000 each year of their four-year program. More students were added each year. In 2017, an accelerated phase of the program began. The Thompsons requested Grand Valley increase the number of students getting the scholarship, and they added other colleges to the list as well.

Grand Valley is now selecting 100 incoming first-year students and 25 Michigan

community college transfer students to receive \$5,000 each year for four years, and the number of student recipients will continue to grow.

"Bob and Ellen's passion for students and their commitment to giving is simply remarkable," said President Thomas J. Haas.

"Students from hard-working families around the state will more easily see a Grand Valley degree in their future because of this \$5,000-a-year award."

The Thompsons sold their company, Thompson-McCully, Michigan's largest asphalt paving company, after 40 years in business. They both believe education changes lives. At the heart of their support for this program is Bob and Ellen's respect for the workers employed in their asphalt and concrete businesses.

"I see how long and hard some people work, and the dreams they have for their children," said Ellen Thompson. "We've been fortunate and want to help the students realize those dreams. I receive notes from those who have received Thompson scholarships, and they tell me they also want to give back some day."

Results are important to the Thompsons. Since working with Grand Valley, they've seen the impressive graduation rates of students and the dedication of faculty and staff to student success. The cohorts of students moving through the TWFS program must reach an 80 percent, six-year graduation rate, and Grand Valley must provide financial and practical support.

Nicole Webb, collections manager for Grand Valley's art gallery, has returned to the university for both her love of art and passion for interacting with students.

Webb graduated from Grand Valley in 2009 with a bachelor's degree in both art history and anthropology. She earned a master's degree in historical administration at Eastern Illinois State University and began working as the curator of collections at the Historical Museum at Fort Missoula for seven years before returning to campus this year.

"I always knew I wanted to come home," said Webb, "and in many ways Grand Valley was always home."

Webb's responsibilities include a variety of tasks, all pertaining to managing more than 16,000 pieces of art in the university collection. These pieces range from paintings, sculptures, and other artwork; they also vary in creator as the collection includes pieces by students and professionals.

"In many ways my job is to care for those 16,000 things," she said. "No day is ever the same. I

like to call what I do 'art emergencies.' Anytime a pipe bursts or something is hit with a backpack, it's my job to problem solve and resolve the issue."

Her favorite piece is one that she has admired since she was student. It's an untitled drawing of a man by Mark Ripley, located on the second floor of the Glenn A. Niemeyer Living Center.

Webb's next goal is to bring in more student help to the art gallery in the form of jobs or internships.

"It's been a great experience to see what has changed in 10 years," said Webb. "If you would have asked me what my career goals were four months ago, this would have been it, so I'm just happy to be back."



The Grand Valley community is mourning the loss of Carl Insalaco. emeritus professor of psychology, who died March 31 at his home in California. During his 25-year career at the university, Insalaco served as chair of the Psychology Department.
