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Three commencement ceremonies scheduled

More than 3,000 students will participate in commencement ceremonies April 28-29 at Van Andel Arena in Grand Rapids.

For the first time, commencement has expanded to three ceremonies to improve the overall experience for graduates and their families. The first ceremony will take place at

7 p.m. on Friday; second and third ceremonies will take place at 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. on Saturday.

Shelley Padnos, chair of the executive committee of Louis Padnos Iron and Metal Company, is the speaker for the Friday ceremony. On Saturday, Sean Patrick Welsh, executive vice president and regional president

for PNC Bank, is the morning speaker, and Erion Veliaj, Grand Valley alumnus and mayor of Tirana, Albania, is the afternoon speaker.

Padnos is among the third generation of family members overseeing Louis Padnos Iron and Metal Company. She was appointed to serve on the National Advisory Council

Welsh began his banking career in 1986 and has held several vice president positions in finance, corporate banking and investment real estate. He serves on boards for The Right Place, Spectrum Health Systems, Grand Valley University Foundation, among others.

Veliaj was elected mayor of Tirana in 2015 and has been involved in Albania's political system since 2003 when he founded MJAFT!, which raises awareness for diverse social and political issues in Albania. He has

Provost surprised by announcement of scholarship, naming of center

Provost Gayle R. Davis was surprised by her colleagues by announcements at both of her retirement celebrations.

A scholarship fund in her name was detailed April 18, and the announcement of the naming of the Women's Center as the Gayle R. Davis Center for Gender Equity was made April 20.

recognitions honor Davis' 15 years of service at Grand Valley as provost and executive vice president for Academic and Student Affairs.

During her tenure, Davis shepherded a major reorganization of the university's colleges, and oversaw major growth in enrollment and significant success in retaining students through graduation.

President Thomas J. Haas made the announcement and said the scholarship's goal is to reduce the financial pressure on students and their families and make a Grand Valley education accessible to students from all backgrounds.

The scholarship will be awarded to a junior or senior who is the first person in their immediate family to pursue a college degree.

School of Communications to undergo reorganization

Provost Gayle R. Davis has announced a reorganization of the eight programs within the School of Communications.

Davis said the changes will better meet and support the educational needs of students, faculty and staff; the reorganization will take effect prior to the 2017-2018 academic year.

The following changes will take place in August:

The Theater Department will become part of what is currently called

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the Music and Dance Department, while the photography, and film and video production programs will join the Art and Design Department. The School of Communications will continue to facilitate the communications studies, advertising and public relations, broadcasting, multi-media journalism and health communications programs, in addition to the communications graduate program.

No units will be closed or created by these changes, nor will curriculum in the majors be affected.

Davis said the realignment will better support students, faculty and staff members by offering increased opportunities for visibility, collaboration and innovation as the programs will be housed with others that have operational parallels. She added that the new formulation will also more closely meet the expectations of the university's accreditation bodies.

Fred Antczak, dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, said that he is enthusiastic about the future of the SOC and other reorganized CLAS departments.

university's civic action plan.

The plan will drive Grand Valley's future work around sustainable partnerships, student civic engagement, place-based contributions, and challenges to social and economic inequalities. Provost Gayle R. Davis said the plan is a timely response to local and national issues.

'There is so much inequity and polarization in our country," Davis said.

"This plan will help our students go out and talk to our community partners and residents civilly to understand their issues from their point of view. This prepares students not only to be employees but to be leaders in a complicated society."

Davis also said the civic action plan sets the stage for Grand Valley to apply for the

Carnegie Foundation's classification of a "community engaged" campus by 2020.

The plan follows the commitment President Thomas J. Haas made to the Campus Compact, a coalition of 1,000 institutions committed to the public purposes of higher education. Haas called the public purpose of

Salvador Lopez, Associate **Director of Admissions**

After moving to Grand Rapids from California, Salvador Lopez attended Grand Rapids Community College. One day, seemingly from luck, he stumbled onto Grand Valley's Allendale campus. He fell in love with Grand Valley, and now he works to help more students find the university.

'Once students are here, and they see the campus like I did, they'll fall in love with it," Lopez said. "We want to make it easy for students to come to Grand Valley."

As an associate director of Admissions, Lopez focuses on diversity recruitment. He started working in admissions in 2013, focusing on bringing underrepresented communities to Grand Valley.

'Since I come from poverty and an underrepresented community, it always made sense to try to connect with students on how they can achieve success in higher education, that's my big goal," Lopez said.

On top of making sure students get a chance to visit the university, Lopez wants to support underrepresented and first-generation students.

"Retention and graduation rates are the best forms of recruitment," Lopez said. "How can I better help students be successful here, so that I can then recruit more students?"

Families and students meet with Lopez every

day, either one-onone or through small presentations. He travels to Detroit and Flint for recruiting, while also advising regional recruiters in Chicago and Detroit.

On-campus involvement is key when focusing on student success, Lopez said. He is the co-chair of Laker Familia, a studentled group dedicated to helping Latino and

Latina students. He also meets with a Student Senate group to gain feedback.

"Wearing different hats is a challenge, but once I see the students on campus through Laker Familia, it allows me to reflect on the work that our office has done," Lopez said.

Staving connected with what happens on campus is helpful when Lopez meets with recruiting teams. He said knowing the successes and challenges of students improves their

"When I came to the university, the staff, whether it was people in admissions or professors, really made a difference," Lopez said. "I want to be able to help others the same way I got help."
