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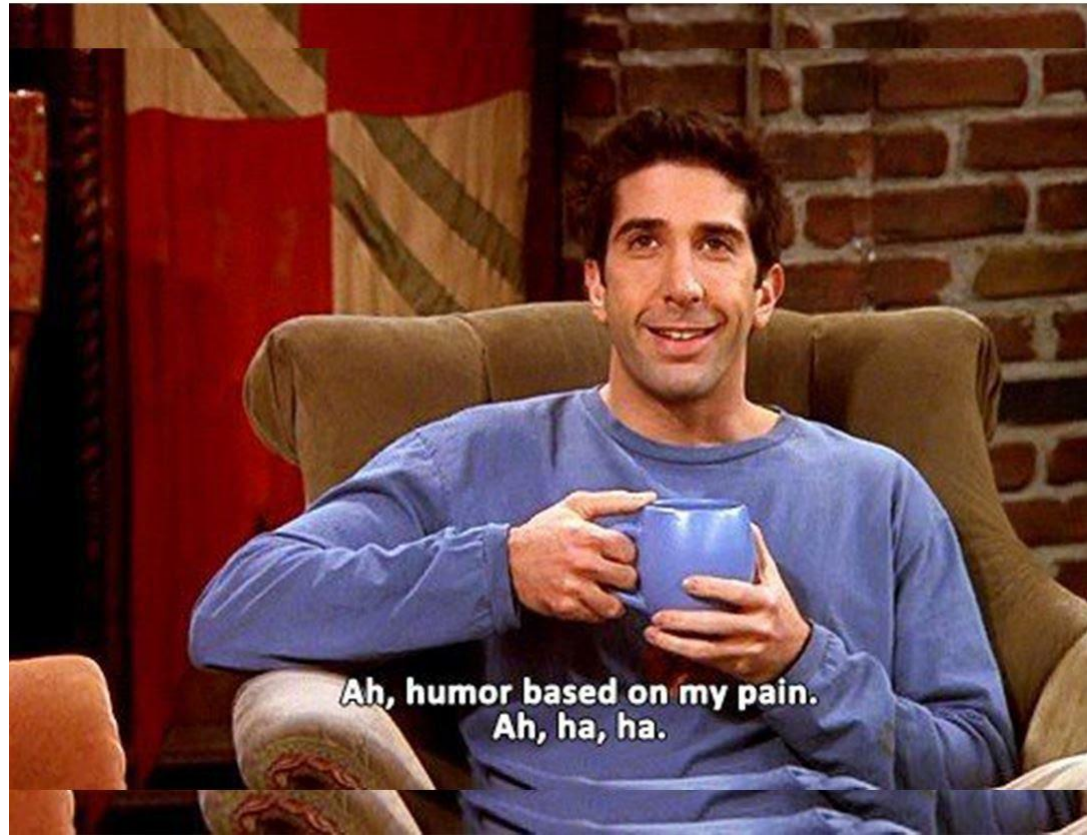

Simple Steps of a Job Search

1. Understand What You Bring to the World-of-Work (Skills, Experience, Knowledge)
2. Explore Your Options
3. Prepare Job Search Tools
4. Set Goals/Get Organized/Stay Organized
5. Network, Network, Network

Some of the things that get in the way of a simple search

- Spending 90-100% of our time searching exclusively online
- Making a decision about what job we want before we even have a choice
- Waiting for someone to respond/ Interpreting a lack of response as something we did wrong
- Assuming we didn't get a job because of something we did wrong in the interview
- Believing that networking makes you appear like a desperate job seeker
- Focusing on what we want vs. what the employers needs are

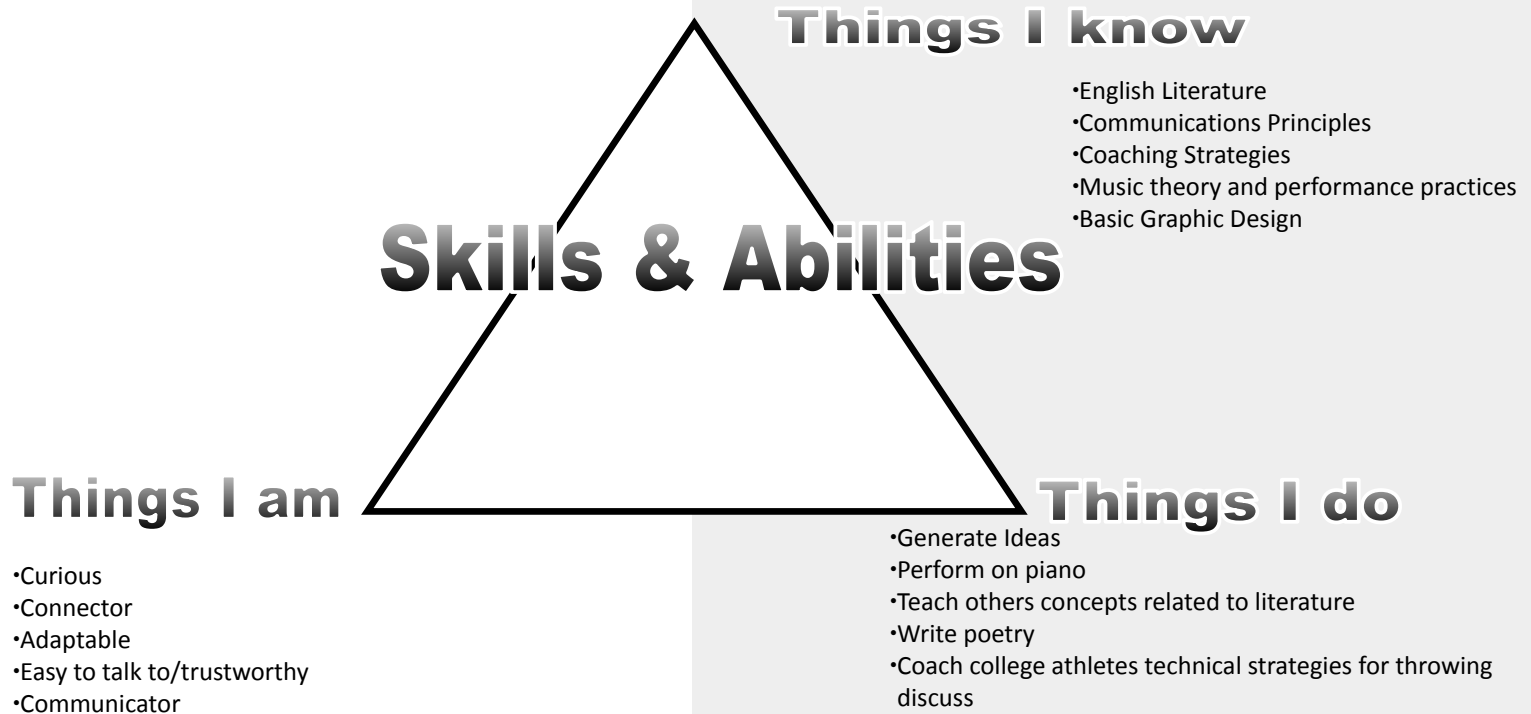

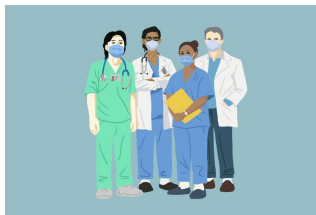

Set Goals/Get Organized/Stay Organized

- 1.What is your goal?** This should be specific, reasonable and attainable: *My goal is to be working full-time by September 1 in the field of supply chain management. Preferably I will be working in the Midwest.*
- 2. Why is this type of job ideal for you?** Do you have education in this area? Work experience?: *Not only did I study supply chain management but my coursework included work-place projects with local employers. Additionally I participated in two internships—one focused on logistics and the other was set within a manufacturing company.*
- 3.What are your challenges and/or obstacles in reaching your goal?** *The only way to knock down an obstacle is to know what it is: I renewed my lease before I had a job and now my job search is limited to local companies that do not seem to be hiring.*
- 4.How can you remove these obstacles?** If you feel you have an impossible challenge to overcome, it's time to call in your mentor or a member of your support group for help: *I have researched what it would take to get out of my lease and I believe if I make a salary in the range of \$-\$\$, it would be worth forfeiting my first/last month's rent. I could also ask family for support during this time.*
- 5.Who will help you reach your goal?** Now that you have some research to understand your job opportunities, think about anyone you know who can provide referrals, advice and support: *My professors, mentors, and alumni are great places to start the networking process. I am currently building a networking list.*
- 6.What steps do you need to take to reach your goal?** Make a list—it's as simple as that. I suggest using Excel or another online tool to maintain your list for easy updates. You can also sort these forms by activity and date to keep you organized: *Organization looks differently for everyone!*
- 7.Pick one step right away, and do it!**

Networking is about making connections and gaining information.

Network, Network, Network

A few networking tips:

1. Practice introducing yourself to others whenever you can
2. Remember body language is as important as what you say
3. Know why you are reaching out to someone—What is your ask? What is your why?
4. People will remember the way you made them feel-ask reflective questions
5. Follow up is key! Write a note, connect on Linked In, send a relevant article or idea; the “what” is not as important as the intent. Be sure your engagement is genuine and mutually beneficial.
