# SCHOOL COMMUNITY

By the Numbers

At GVSU, we ensure that each charter public school we authorize is a good fit for its community by providing opportunities to families that better meet their students' individual needs. In this section, you will read more about the learners and communities served by GVSU's charter public schools across Michigan.



#### **Our Schools**

GVSU's portfolio of charter public schools is filled with a variety of innovative options, including:

- College preparatory schools
- Montessori schools
- Project-Based Learning (PBL) schools
- Schools focused on aviation, STEM, or the arts
- Schools designed to serve students dealing with homelessness or other extreme barriers to learning

During the 2023-2024 academic year, GVSU authorized 79 charter public schools, serving 35,017 learners in inner-city, metropolitan, and rural communities throughout Michigan's lower peninsula.

Additionally, a combined 1,276 learners enrolled in the two K-12 statewide cyber schools that GVSU authorized. Those learners represented more than 100 resident school districts located in all corners of the state.






#### **Our Learners**





## ACADEMIC OUTCOMES

Charter school authorizers are responsible for ensuring the learners they serve are growing academically. GVSU uses multiple performance indicators to track learner growth over the course of a school year and best understand how well schools are meeting the academic expectations in their charter contract. In this section, we present 2023-2024 academic results from state assessments and other evaluative data sets.




#### M-Step Results

The M-STEP is an online test administered by the State of Michigan to gauge how well learners are mastering state standards. On the following pages, you will see how each GVSU charter school performed on the 2023-2024 M-STEP for English Language Arts (ELA) and mathematics. You will also see how they grew compared to their peers.

Here's how it works: Each school is assigned a bar chart with four graphs. Two of the graphs measure the school's M-STEP achievement levels in both ELA and math. The other two indicate how the average learner grew in ELA and math compared to their peers, a measurement known as the M-STEP Mean Student Growth Percentile. All measurements are scaled from 1 to 100.


GVSU uses these measures as the basis for evaluating if a school is outperforming statistically similar peer schools, creating the closest "apples to apples" comparison possible.
























































































## SAT Results and the Class of 2024

GVSU and its charter public schools are dedicated to preparing all learners to excel to and through their high school graduation. To ensure graduates have the appropriate skills to succeed, GVSU's charter schools hold students to rigorous standards. Some high schools require students to pass a certain number of Advanced Placement courses before they graduate, offering these college-level courses in all four high school grades. Other schools have students complete semester-long research projects with a company or organization related to their desired professions.

## Providing Learners Earlier Access to College


Charter public schools are designed to rapidly adjust to meet ever-changing community needs. One of the benefits of this design is that adaptations often lead to reduced barriers and increased opportunities for learners.

In recent years, more and more high school learners have sought new ways to engage in college pathways earlier in their learning journey.

To meet this demand, many of GVSU's charter schools have launched early college programs that make higher education more accessible and affordable.


Early college programs are designed to help learners earn an associate degree or certificate for free while still enrolled in high school. Learners enrolled in an early college program are typically on a five-year plan, with the first three years dedicated to high school curriculum, and the final two years focused on earning their college credits. Learners in the programs often continue to receive support from high school counselors, staff, and academic coaches well after they transition to their college coursework.

Early college programs offered in GVSU's charter public schools saw a 7% increase in enrollment from the 2022-2023 school year to the 2023-2024 school year as learners from three additional high schools joined programs for the first time.

## Helping Unique Student Populations Succeed

GVSU's portfolio has nine schools specifically designed to support learners who need extra wrap-around resources and care.

One school, Fostering Leadership Academy, serves a high population of K-8 students in the foster care system through a traumainformed curriculum. The other eight are high schools supporting students who face hurdles like homelessness and expulsion.


Success at these schools is measured differently than it is at other GVSU charter schools, and students are applauded for achieving unique academic goals. Five high schools are operated in partnership with Youth Vision Solutions, serving students in Wayne County and Grand Rapids. GVSU first authorized schools in this network in 2013.



#### **Our School Boards**




These boards are composed of passionate individuals from diverse backgrounds who understand what the students, families, and educators in their community specifically need for the school to fulfill its mission today and for future generations.



## **DEDICATION TO EDUCATION:**DETROIT ACHIEVEMENT ACADEMY

If you were to walk into one Detroit Achievement Academy's buildings, you would find elementary learners who are eager to tell you their strongest character strengths as well as the character habits they are working on at that moment.

That expectation of students stems from the school's Habits of Character standards, which are designed to makes students active participants in their own growth and assessment of how they treat themselves and others. DAA's unique intentionality within its standards is what led to the school winning a 2024 Core Value Award for exemplifying the GVSU value of Integrity.

"Habits of Character are core to the foundation of DAA," wrote the school board in their award application. "Integrity is particularly important because it is a trait that extends beyond the classroom and helps build trust between individuals and within communities."

The school breaks character traits into observable, communicable and kid-friendly standards that hold students and staff accountable in weekly

student reflections, student-led conferences, grading systems, and behavior management practices. Students reflect weekly on their progress towards these traits. They submit self-reflections to their teacher, who provides real-time feedback and action steps on their scores. The data for these can be viewed by administrators, support staff, parents, and families as applicable. The final scores are agreed upon between students and their teachers and entered into the gradebook as Character scores. Students report on their Habits of Character growth and performance scores to their families during bi-annual student-led conferences.

Students who show outstanding performance in their character habits are nominated as "Light Leaders." Light Leaders consistently role model appropriate behavior, honesty in their interactions with others, respect the rules, and promote fairness. The Light Leaders meet once a week to help coordinate school community activities, practice facilitating tours, brainstorm ideas to keep school space beautiful, and plan for Better World Day.

## **DEDICATION TO EDUCATION:**THE GREENSPIRE SCHOOL

GVSU sees the charter public schools that it authorizes as extensions of the university community, which comes with the expectation that each school environment reflects GVSU's five core values. The GVSU CSO annually recognizes schools that meet this expectation by presenting a Core Values Award to a school whose program, project, practice, or other initiative best demonstrates advancement of a particular value.

One of the two Core Values Awards that were presented in 2024 for the value of Integrity went to The Greenspire School for their student ambassador program.

According to Greenspire's board, the program is an outward expression and advertisement of serving with integrity. "Our ambassadors want all to know that the ethics, education and interpersonal relationships we offer exemplify educational professionals and fellow students living by our openly stated school values and principles," wrote the board in its award application.

At Greenspire, student ambassadors are selected each year based on academic standing and consistent positive behavior. Those who are selected to be ambassadors promote a positive and accurate image of the school to the greater community and assist in helping the school achieve its vision.

Student ambassadors are responsible for providing tours to families and guests, acting as a guide for prospective students who sit in on school classes during "Fake a Day" afternoons, and assist with key community promotion events. Student ambassadors are also tasked with supporting fellow students by encouraging others to show respect in all aspects of school life, to listen with intentionality rather than just waiting to respond, and to honor each other's thoughts, wishes and words.

"This program is the essence of who we are as a school," the board said, "and we are so proud of each individual who is a part of it."

#### Additional Annual Support from GVSU

According to Michigan charter school law, charter authorizers may retain up to 3% of the per-pupil funds its charter schools receive. At GVSU, some of these funds are used to cover operational costs; however, a significant portion is returned to the schools either directly or through supplemental support opportunities.

One of the direct ways that schools receive financial support comes from the GVSU CSO's Academic Grant opportunity. Every school can be awarded the grant by accomplishing specific education and compliance goals throughout the course of the school year. The goals are aligned with their charter contract and are designed to be inclusive of all schools. The amount each school receives for each grant criteria it meets is determined by the number of students in each building.

GVSU also provides financial assistance for the educators working in its schools who want to continue their lifelong learning.

Certified teachers can apply for the Continuing Education Scholarship, which gives recipients a 50% tuition discount when they enroll in certain graduate courses at Grand Valley. The discount increases to 80% for teachers who have worked five or more consecutive years in a GVSU charter school.

Finally, the GVSU CSO supports undergraduate education learners through the GVSU Charter Public Schools Clinical Field Experience Scholarship. The scholarship covers one semester of tuition for a select number of Grand Valley learners who complete their student-teaching requirements in a GVSU charter school.
