Career Center

The Career Center provides undergraduate, graduate, and alumni learners with in-person and virtual career-led resources including career development, career planning and preparation, job and internship searching strategies, and networking events and opportunities. Career Center staff includes a dedicated employer development team who builds relationships that support experiential learning, post-graduate employment, and Career Center advisors assigned to each major. This approach allows for rich partnerships between academic departments and the Career Center staff to benefit the career activities of learners and alumni. They look forward to working with you!

Center for Community and Experiential Engagement (CCEE)

The Center for Community and Experiential Engagement advocates for and supports programs that provide students with practical skills and real-world experience. Through the lens of equity and excellence, our programs support high-impact and experiential learning opportunities that ensure all students gain the confidence to pursue their passions. Specifically, our center focuses on supporting internships, embedding projects with external partners into coursework, and career-connected events and curriculum development in close collaboration with the other experiential learning support offices on campus. Additionally, through the Regional Math and Science Program, we support the STEM talent pipeline, partnering with GVSU students, faculty, and staff to deliver effective K-12 outreach, summer camps, and Regional Michigan Science Olympiad programs.

Center for Student Research and Scholarly Engagement (CSRSE)

The Center for Student Research and Scholarly Engagement (CSRSE) supports GVSU students pursuing research, scholarship, and creative work outside the classroom, in the community, and across the globe. CSRSE houses three programs, the Office of Undergraduate Research and Scholarship (OURS), the Frederik Meijer Office of Fellowships, and Graduate Student Research. Faculty can connect a student with the right resource whether they're just starting a project, applying for a competitive fellowship, or pursuing graduate-level research. Together, these offices help students conduct research and apply for competitive national and international fellowships, study abroad, and post-graduate opportunities. CSRSE also organizes events where faculty and students connect directly, including the Undergraduate Research Fair, Student Scholars Day, and the Chalk Art Symposium.

Dean of Students

Located in the Lubbers Student Services Center, the Dean of Students Office provides support, resources, and advocacy for students and their families/supporters. The office partners with faculty, staff, parents, supporters, and community members to help students navigate challenges, address concerns, and succeed both academically and personally. Through initiatives such as the Student Care referral process, Student Integrity, and Student Voice and Support, the Dean of Students Office promotes student well-being, upholds community standards, empowers students, and connects Lakers with appropriate campus and community resources.

Department of Public Safety

The Department of Public Safety is committed to maintaining a safe and secure environment to learn, live, and work for students, faculty, staff, and visitors. The Department of Public Safety patrols campus 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, to provide a safe environment for the Grand Valley community. The downtown campus is comprised of sworn law enforcement in addition to security staff and student cadets. The Department of Public Safety is located at 609 Watson SW, Grand Rapids, MI, 40504. Digital Accessibility Committee

New federal ADA Title II rules require public universities like GVSU to ensure that all digital content meets WCAG 2.1 Level AA standards. This applies broadly to websites, documents, videos, and course materials, not just centrally managed pages. The goal is to ensure equal access while reducing institutional risk and last-minute remediation. Because nearly everyone on campus creates or shares digital content, accessibility needs to be built in from the start, supported by clear guidance, tools, and shared responsibility across the university. The Digital Accessibility Committee provides guidance, tools, and training to support that work across campus.

eLearning Technologies

Visit with staff from Information Technology, eLearning Technologies, Academic Research Computing, and IT Innovation & Research to learn how we partner with faculty to enhance teaching, advance research, and foster innovation across the university.

Facilities Services Grand Rapids/Transportation Services

Facilities Services Grand Rapids and Regional Centers is a multifaceted department that provides building management of the Grand Rapids Campus, Health Campus, regional centers, and leased spaces. Their department also administers Grand Valley's Transportation and Parking Services which provides inter-campus bus service and parking management for the University.

Faculty Research and Innovation Center (FRIC)

At Grand Valley State University, research, scholarship, and creative activity are essential components of the university's mission as an institution of higher learning. The services and funding available through FRIC can help you start, build, and sustain successful and rewarding scholarly pursuits. Offices under FRIC include: Office of Research Compliance and Integrity (ORCI) (www.gvsu.edu/rci), Office of Sponsored Programs (OSP) (www.gvsu.edu/grants), Technology Commercialization Office (TCO) (www.gvsu.edu/tco), Dorothy A. Knowledge Market

The Knowledge Market is the umbrella for peer academic support services at the university, staffed by highly trained peer consultants and tutors. Consultants and tutors work one-on-one with individuals and small student groups to explain course content, develop research strategies, improve writing, polish presentations, and complete digital projects. All consultants and tutors are trained in helping students learn reading and study strategies. Made up of the **Tutoring and Reading Center**, **Library Research Center**, **Writing Center**, **Speech Lab**, and **Digital Creator Lab**, the Knowledge Market is founded on the principles that learning can be cultivated through the social act of sharing power, skills, and information, and that a person's peers can—with proper training and support—provide them with valuable assistance in developing lifelong skills.

Padnos Center for Global Engagement (PCGE)

The Padnos Center for Global Engagement (PCGE) advances GVSU's commitment to preparing globally minded graduates by connecting students, faculty, and partners through meaningful global learning experiences. PCGE supports study abroad and study away, international student and scholar services, global partnerships, collaborative online international learning (COIL), and other high-impact educational opportunities. We partner with faculty to develop education abroad experiences, to build international collaborations, to integrate global perspectives into teaching and learning, and to support the success of our international students and scholars. Whether you're leading a faculty-led program, exploring a new global partnership, or looking to internationalize your curriculum, PCGE is here to help.

Pew Faculty Teaching and Learning Center

The Robert and Mary Pew Faculty Teaching and Learning Center (Pew FTLC) supports faculty from across the university, regardless of discipline, rank, or career stage. Programs and services foster dialogue and community-building around teaching and learning. Whether through their mentoring programs, learning communities, grant opportunities, consultations, or workshops, faculty are invited to engage with scholarly approaches to teaching, reflection on professional practice, inclusive student engagement, and personalized lifelong learning.

Student Academic Success Center

Faculty play a key role in student success by identifying students who may need support and making referrals to campus services. The Student Academic Success Center is a hub for coordinating responses to faculty feedback provided through alerts and progress reports and providing academic success coaching. Stop by and find out how you can support your students in finding success in your course and beyond.

University Libraries and Art Museum

The University Libraries and Art Museum are here to support your teaching and research needs. Liaison librarians are assigned to the students and faculty of every department. Liaison Librarians can also connect you with functional specialists to assist in using the Libraries and Art Museum services and collections. WGVU

WGVU Public Media is a 100% community funded and licensed affiliate of GVSU providing 27 counties of West Michigan with PBS (Public Broadcasting Service) as well as NPR (National Public Radio) for the Greater Grand Rapids and Lakeshore areas.
