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# **New Studio ART B.F.A Degree**

Beginning in Fall 2022 there will be updates to both courses and requirements in the Studio Art B.F.A. degree. This updated ("New") curriculum presents several benefits, including:

- Access Majors will have earlier, increased opportunity to study in all 8 Studio Art emphasis areas
- Exploration Students will enjoy more space and flexibility in their course schedules to pursue multiple interests and diversify knowledge and experience
- Flexibility Students will be better able to customize their routes to completing the B.F.A., including increased opportunity to engage deeply in more than one emphasis area

Students beginning their BFA (Bachelor in Fine Art) degree in the Fall of 2022 (or after) should follow the New Curriculum. Refer to the Section of this Document entitled "PLANNING FOR THE FIRST TWO YEARS OF THE STUDIO ART BFA on the New Curriculum" on page 4.

Students who are in-process with their B.F.A. degree before Fall of 2022 will remain on the Old curriculum but can decide to change to the New Curriculum.

Students who remain on the Old Curriculum will be able to complete their requirements by taking equivalent courses.

Students who choose the New Curriculum will receive credit for all studio courses they were required to take under the Old Curriculum. For example: ART 152 (Color and Design) and ART 157 (Drawing II) are required in the Old Curriculum, but not for the New Curriculum; both courses will count as studio electives in the New Curriculum.

## **How to Compare and Change Curricula**

The official and complete versions of Curricula are found in the University Catalogs; Old (2021-2022 and before), and New (2022-23). The best way to see how each curriculum applies to a student's degree is by using the "What-if" function in MyPath to change which catalog year is shown. If students wish to change their official catalog year to one different than the academic year they started at GVSU, they can do that by contacting the University Registrar. Students can choose any catalog year between when they began at GVSU, and when they graduate.

**NOTES**: The remainder of the 120-credit BFA degree is comprised of general education courses, spread over all four years. The chart above does not account for the likelihood of "double-dipping", which would reduce both the course load each semester and the total gen ed courses required.

## PLANNING FOR THE FIRST TWO YEARS OF THE STUDIO ART BFA on the NEW Curriculum

The new curriculum makes space for Studio Art majors to explore multiple areas and broaden their transferable skill set, forming an integrated and self-designed pathway through the major. Students are able to choose to study at variable depths in their chosen emphasis and achieve some depth in another areas. Any GVSU student may declare a Studio Art Major directly on Banner and will be directed to designate a preliminary Emphasis Area at that time.

Exploration spans the first two years of study and culminates in the Second Year Review when students confirm their Emphasis in the Studio Art Major. Students should plan to complete the required courses and schedule their Second Year Review as early as possible in the program paying attention to the diversity of courses required. The Second Year Review marks the conclusion of the introductory part of the program and supports the student with advising and planning for the remainder of their studies. A faculty review panel will assess craft, technique, strengths, and interests evident in the studio work from completed and in-progress courses. This advisory review happens near the end of the semester that students will have completed (or transferred) the following courses:

- ART 150 Foundations: 2-D Design & Color
- ART 151 Foundations: 3-D Design
- ART 153 Foundations: Making and Meaning
- ART 155 Foundations: Drawing 1
- 5 other studios in 4 different areas, including the required course from a 3D area (Ceramics, Jewelry/Metalsmithing or Sculpture).

NOTE: ART 150 is a prerequisite for ART 210, the entry point into the Graphic Design emphasis.

## **GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR THE STUDIO ART BFA**

Each of the 8 emphasis area pathways consist of 5 required courses and offer up to 3 additional options.

- 1. Students are required to complete coursework in at least 5 separate Studio Art areas, including a minimum requirement of 1 course in Ceramics, Jewelry & Metalsmithing, or Sculpture. This change encourages broader exploration across the major.
- 2. Students are required to complete a minimum of 2 courses in at least 2 Studio Art emphasis areas, assuring deeper exploration in more than one area of the major.
- 3. Students are required to complete 1 course in Film & Video Production (FVP) or Photography (PH), expanding the professional skill set of all Studio Art BFA students.
- 4. Students are required to complete a minimum 7 additional studio courses outside emphasis area, which may include 1 additional FVP/PH studio course. This change both broadens and deepens each Studio Art BFA student's skill set.

## **BENCHMARKS**

## **SECOND YEAR ADVISORY REVIEW**

Important details about the Second Year Review are discussed above and available in the GVSU Catalog.

## **JUNIOR REVIEW**

Two semesters before their B.F.A. exhibition, all B.F.A. students are required to present a faculty review panel with examples of the work they have completed since their Second Year Review. Complete information on this review is available in the GVSU Catalog.

## **B.F.A. EXHIBITION**

In order to complete their Senior Project (ART 415, 416, or 498), graduating B.F.A. students must present their work in either a group exhibition or solo exhibition, reviewed by Studio Art faculty and earning a grade of at least a C.
