Program Notes

Fanfare and Flourishes

Fanfare and Flourishes was composed in 1991 and features a prominent musical theme from Marc-Antoine Charpentier's *Te Deum*. As the title suggests, an exciting fanfare opens the piece, giving way to renaissance inspired melodies that feature multiple sections of the ensemble in turn. The concert band version of this work was commissioned by the Alfred M. Barbe High School Band, Steve Hand, director.

Alleluia! Laudamus Te

Allelnia! Landamus Te is a hymn of praise without words, with the band serving as a single massive choir and, at times, broken down into individual sections, each performing as a separate choir. The music is based on three main themes, the first being a massive chorale in the brass, the second a long flowing line in the horns and woodwinds, and the third a quasi-fanfare figure first heard in the trumpets and then spreading throughout the other sections of the orchestra as it is developed. The work was commissioned by Richard S. Mountford and the Malone College Concert Band, which premiered the work, conducted by Reed, at its third annual band festival in February 1973.

Old Scottish Melody

Robert Burns' 1788 poem is based on a traditional Scottish ballad, which also served as bases for poems that predated Burns', such as Robert Ayton and James Watson. The text invites us to remember days of yore. In addition to its appearance as we recognize the onset of the new year, the song is used across the world for other occasions such as funerals (Chile) and graduation ceremonies (Hungary).

This setting of a Puerto Rican carol for concert band initially gives the effect of a smaller, more intimate traditional ensemble. Various combinations of instruments, colors, textures, and rhythms are explored, showcasing the many sonic colors available with concert band instrumentation.

Military Symphony in F

Gossec's *Symphonie Militaire* was written in 1793-94 during the French Revolution for the Band of the National Guard. Writing in the Journal of Band Research (Vol. 6, No. 1), David Swanzy proposes that this work has a fourth movement for choir and band, thus predating Beethoven's choral symphony by a full 30 years. He indicates that "perhaps Gossec should be given credit as the 'father' of the choral symphony."

The first movement of this symphony is spirited and majestic and is written in the key of F, a common key for the period because of the preponderance of brass instruments built in F and restricted to upper partial tones. The second movement is a short, melodic pastorale in a slow 6/8 meter. The third movement is fast and exciting even though the tonality of C major may seem a bit inconclusive.

Puszta

A versatile composer and arranger, Van der Roost is represented by works for wind band, brass quintet, orchestra, choir, chamber ensemble, piano, and guitar. His compositions have been performed on radio and television and recorded in over 35 countries. This suite of four gypsy dances was written in 1987. While having the definitive sound of authentic folk dances, the themes and melodies are all original. The dances alternate from bright and colorful to tranquil and melancholic, moods typical of gypsy music.

Lying to the south and east of the Danube, the Puszta is the great Hungarian plain or prairie country that was home to nomadic shepherds and fierce horsemen. The region is noted as the original home of the celebrated Lipizzaner stallions.
