## **Program Notes**

#### Suite Française d'après Claude Gervaise

This compilation of short character pieces was originally written as incidental music for a French play. As a standalone concert work it translates into seven short musical hors d'oeuvres that, in the hands of experienced musicians, are a delight to audiences. Nadia Boulanger encouraged Poulenc to seek inspiration from the 1545 work *Libre de Danceries* by Claude Gervaise, a French court composer. Reflecting this influence, straightforward, diatonic melodies are decorated with contemporary harmonies. The colorful scoring evokes Debussy and Satie.

#### **Splinter**

In this context, the word "splinter" means to break into small, sharp fragments, and refers to the way in which the piece is structured as a type of mosaic or stylistic patchwork. Many sections of the piece feature instrument sounds breaking or distorting in some way -- whether this be in the extremes of register, wild glissandos, or crunchy chords.

The other meaning of "splinter" is as a foreign object within the body. This acts as a metaphor for my experimentation with some lighter, delicate moments, which are not always part of my musical sound world.

- Program Note by composer

#### Symphony No. 3

Symphony #3 was composed between September 2014 and February 2015 in Austin, Texas as my doctoral dissertation composition. One of the main intentions of this symphony is that extremes (particularly of dynamics and tempo) must be earned: that there must be strong emotional or narrative content underlying each surface element of the piece. It was revised in 2019 in anticipation of its premiere performance, on February 8, 2020.

The overarching idea of the symphony explores the relationship between the two opening motives: the FGCF quartal block chords and the fluttering concert A texture. They are initially presented in a way which makes them seem like opposites, but as the symphony progresses, it becomes clear that they are part of the same element, destined to unify.
