In conjunction with the Kaufman Interfaith Institute, the Interfaith Dialogue Association and numerous campus departments, we will host a series of interfaith dialogue for students, faculty and staff members which starts this fall. Wade H. McCree Summer Bridge Program

his summer, the members of the Wade H. McCree, Jr. Incentive Program and high school class of 2012 had a taste of college life through Grand Valley's inaugural Wade H. McCree Summer Bridge Program. For some students, it was their first step on a college campus. For all students, it was a step closer to achieving their goal of attending college.

Named in honor of Wade H. McCree, Jr., former U.S. solicitor general and distinguished professor at the University of Michigan, the program reflects a

unified commitment by Michigan's public universities to further increase and enhance opportunities in higher education for first-generation college students. The Wade H. McCree, Jr. Incentive Program at Grand Valley provides an outstanding educational opportunity for students to reach their full potential as scholars in the classroom and as citizens in their respective communities.

In its first year, the Summer Bridge Program gave high school students opportunities to take a deeper look into



the academic programs and the resources available on campus. Students received a welcome from George Davis, associate director of Admissions, who gave an overview of Grand Valley's admissions process and timeline. Students were provided with team building challenges, and, while strategizing how to conquer various obstacles, they started to learn about themselves and how to rely on each other.

Next, the students were split into smaller groups to compete in the Amazing Race: GVSU edition. Equipped

with nothing but clues and water bottles on a hot summer day, the students took to campus to race against time and the heat. From the eye-popping, "red shoes" displayed in Lake Ontario Hall to the newly dedicated Kelly Family Sports Center, students discovered many of Grand Valley's treasures.

The day included tours of resources available in the Student Services Building, Kirkhof Center, as well as various classrooms, labs and lecture halls. But the best challenge came at the end of the day when the students took

on the Recreation Center's climbing wall. With 2,600 square feet of climbing surface, students tested their strength, endurance, focus and problem-solving skills.

The goal of the Summer Bridge
Program is to encourage the students to
continue their education after high school
and diminish their fears about college. We
hope it also encourages them to see their
futures here at Grand Valley and become a
part of our community.

The grant started in the fall of 2006 to provide an opportunity for underrepresented students to discover firsthand the potential of a college education. Grand Valley's GEAR UP/College Day Program targeted Grand Rapids Public Schools middle school students in the seventh grade, working with them until their senior year.

GEAR UP/CD is funded by the U.S. Department of Education, State of Michigan Department of Labor and Economic Growth and Grand Valley.

raveling abroad has always been a dream for me. My dream finally came true this summer when I participated in the Grand Valley trip to East China Normal University in Shanghai, China. I participated in the faculty-led program with Professor Geling Shang from the Philosophy Department. There were 16 students from Grand Valley who participated. While overseas, our group stayed in the international student dorms and I completed a business ethics and comparative philosophy course.

MBEC Scholarship Winner

ridget Robinson knew that joining the Multicultural Business Education Cohort program would help her be successful in her college career. What she didn't know is that her participation would provide her with a unique scholarship opportunity.



Robinson, a senior majoring in management and health care information systems, was selected as the first recipient of the Dean Emeritus Don Williams Sr. Multicultural Business Education Scholarship. This scholarship was established by Ray Bennett, '92, an alumnus of the MBEC program and senior vice president of lodging development for Marriott International. Bennett wanted to create the scholarship to recognize and assist MBEC students with the cost of education. Bennett chose to name the scholarship after Williams as a tribute to his work and legacy at Grand Valley.

Robinson was one of many students who applied for the scholarship. The selection process included a written essay describing why they deserve the scholarship, future career goals and plans to help others and serve their communities. All candidates were interviewed by the scholarship committee.

Robinson is from Detroit and a 2007 graduate from Mumford High School. She chose Grand Valley for its location and to experience a more diverse group of people. When she first arrived on campus, she had to quickly learn to live independently and adjust to college life and the demands of classes. She was very happy with the level of support she found at Grand Valley, especially through the MBEC program.

When asked what advice she would give other students, Robinson said: "Ask for help. It's OK to seek help from your professor, counselor or go to tutoring. Take advantage of every resource made available to you." She also encouraged students to stay on track for graduation. "Stay focused on your coursework, even if you are feeling frustrated. Just remind yourself that it will all be worthwhile after you graduate," she said.

After graduation, Robinson plans to work in the health care field in a business management role.
