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

What is Responsible Authorship?

- Each listed author takes full responsibility for the content.
- Avoid *gift* or *guest* authorship.
- Consider documenting contributions early in the project
 - Consider contributor roles (such as CRediT taxonomy) to clarify contributions and reduce ambiguity
 - Collectively determine authorship order and note how practices may vary by discipline



CRediT's 14 Contributor Roles

- Conceptualization
- Data curation
- Formal analysis
- Funding acquisition
- Investigation
- Methodology
- Project administration
- Resources
- Software
- Supervision
- Validation
- Visualization
- Writing – original draft
- Writing – review & editing

Citation Practices and Privilege

- Always cite accurately and double-check references.
- Watch for AI hallucinated citations.
- Remember to cite yourself when necessary but also be wary of inflating one's scholarly impact.
- Citation privilege refers to the tendency to cite work from more visible authors/journals, which amplifies inequities in recognition and impact.



Citation Justice



- Citation Justice is the act of consciously citing people with marginalized identities to uplift their voices.
- References can be used to challenge oppressive systems that have silenced and erased the intellectual contributions of women and BIPOC scholars.
- You can practice citation justice by:
 - Researching diverse authors
 - Tracking your citations
 - Writing a citation diversity statement

Citation Justice

Practicing citation justice takes time and effort. Doing this work helps correct years of scholars disregarding the voices and ideas of marginalized people.

Citation justice is not about citing people only for their identities. It's about challenging power.

AI and Publishing Ethics

- AI tools can assist with writing, editing, and organizing references but cannot be credited as authors.
- Any use of AI tools should be disclosed in the manuscript (such as in the methods or acknowledgements).
- Authors remain fully responsible for the accuracy, citations, and integrity of their work.



AI and Publishing Ethics

- Check Publisher guidelines before using AI
 - Wiley
 - Wiley welcomes the thoughtful use of AI tools. Authors may only use AI Technology as a companion to their writing process, not a replacement.
 - Cambridge University Press
 - AI use must be declared and clearly explained in publications
 - AI does not meet the Cambridge requirements for authorship
 - Authors are accountable for the accuracy, integrity and originality of their research papers

Conclusion



Responsible authorship and citation are fundamental to uphold research integrity. Understanding variations in authorship norms and the influence of citation practices helps mitigate bias. Transparent use of AI tools and ethical accountability strengthens the credibility and trustworthiness of scholarly publishing.
