**Applying to the Athletic Training Program (Admission is Competitive):**

1. \* Indicate the prerequisite courses for admission into the AT program (PED 217, ATH 210, MOV 300). These courses require a minimum grade of a B.
2. Current First Aid and CPR Certification
3. Proof of current immunization as defined by the CDC for health care workers
4. Cumulative GPA of 2.8 or Higher
5. One Semester of Attendance at GVSU
6. Successful completion of a criminal background check and drug screening
7. The earliest students can apply is in the fall of their sophomore year, and application takes place twice a year, in the fall and winter semesters.

**Notes:**

<sup>1</sup> Students who pass out of WRT 305 have room to take a GenEd, Theme, or elective course in this semester.

**Special Notes:**

- A. This is a **general** curriculum guide and will not work for everyone, especially those students who have AP or CLEP credit.
- B. Courses that have *(Gen Ed)* written after them are classes that are required in the major and also fulfill a section of the general education program.
- C. Remember to fulfill your 2 SWS requirements; 1 can be taken in the gen ed program and 1 in your major.
- D. Some classes are in multiple sections within the gen ed. If you take a course that can be counted in two categories, you can open up 1-2 more spots for major electives.
- E. You must have **120 credits** to graduate from Grand Valley State University.
