The purpose of this newsletter is to share information that may be of interest to you. By posting information, it does not mean that we endorse the organizations or services enclosed.

1. Helpful Information for First-Year Students

1. Be sure to stay on track in your classes. It is much easier to establish and maintain a solid GPA then to rebuild it after a tough semester or two. The average GPA of a student entering a M.D program is a 3.65. Utilize the resources on campus. Visit the tutoring website at <http://www.gvsu.edu/tc/> to get more information.
2. Attend class, take notes, do assigned homework and keep up with class readings. This seems simple enough, but it is very easy to fall behind. Be sure to talk with your professor regarding any concerns or problems you may be facing in your classes.

your journey as an undergraduate. Setting up an appointment will give you insight on what will be expected of you, what your options are and the application process for different paths.

4. Be sure to eat healthy and do not skip meals. It is easy to be writing a paper, only to realize it has been 4 hours and you missed dinner. Along with this, do your best to get appropriate amounts of sleep and exercise. This will be beneficial both for success in class and staying healthy. If you are living in the dorms, keep a bottle of hand sanitizer at your desk and use it regularly.

5. Allow time for extra-curriculars. They are important. Find the pre-professional group that is of interest to you. Also, find something that is of interest to you outside of your major and future goals. It is important to take a break from studying and academics, whether it is through exercise and sports, a social organization, religious organization or service and advocacy groups. They all can be beneficial in some way and will compliment your educational experiences. (Don't over-book yourself. Manage your time and you will be successful!)

For those of you who don't know, we have a Resource Room available for students to utilize when preparing for the MCAT, DAT, etc. There are study books available for students to use in the room or to copy pages from for practice. Along with 5 AAMC Computer Based Tests and 9 weeks of live course instruction, students also get the complete 5 book MCAT study set. Also included is a set of 16 mini MCAT books with 16 one hour MCAT practice tests. Students also have 24 hour access to MCAT topics and can post their own questions in the interactive web forum.

Mission

Global Health Corps (GHC) aims to mobilize a global community of young leaders to build a movement for health equity.

The Problem

The extreme disparity in health outcomes and access to healthcare that exists today between the world's rich and the world's poor is unjust and unsustainable. These global health challenges are embedded in a diverse set of social, political and economic contexts that require strong leadership and innovative approaches. The complexity and scope of these challenges necessitate participation from a wide range of fields beyond medicine. Individuals with skills from supply chain management to computer programming to monitoring and evaluation will be essential in remedying the unacceptable inequity of today.

Opportunities for individuals with backgrounds outside of medicine to use their unique skills in public health are scarce. Too many skilled and ambitious young professionals are unaware of or unable to achieve their potential impact in the health field, prolonging the creation and implementation of innovative solutions.

GHC Vision

GHC believes that a global movement of individuals and organizations fighting for improved health outcomes and access to healthcare for the poor is necessary in order to change the unacceptable status quo of extreme inequity. GHC works to build this movement by recruiting, training, and supporting the movement's future leaders and by diversifying the pool of young people working in global health.

GHC provides opportunities for young professionals from diverse backgrounds to work on the frontlines of the fight for global health equity in year-long fellowships. Our fellows will have a measurable impact on the health of the communities in which they work, and draw upon that experience and the GHC alumni network, to deepen their impact throughout their careers.

GHC will create as a pipeline of young leaders for the global health equity movement, and at scale will play a central role in sustaining and consistently reinvigorating this movement for change. This infusion of young, passionate, skilled leaders will help to tip the balance towards a more equitable and just global distribution of health services.

Walking Program Coordinator

Reports to: AmeriCorps VISTA Volunteer

Duties

Coordinate and supervise indoor community walking program at a local elementary school in collaboration with local nursing students, pick up any informational handouts prior to attending walking program each week and distribute to walking program participants as necessary, maintain weekly communication with supervisor and nursing students

Skills required

Strong written/verbal communication skills, comfortable in community health outreach setting, organizational/Planning skills, transportation to site

Time commitment

They ask for a commitment to at least one season (*September-December* or *January-April*), walking program coordinator may supervise for 2 hours each once or twice per week (Monday and/or Thursday from 5:00-7:00 PM)

Medication Assistance Program

Reports to: AmeriCorps VISTA Volunteer

Duties

Help patients access medication assistance programs, coordinates medication dispersal, maintain weekly communication with supervisor

Skills required

Strong written/verbal communication skills, Proficient database entry skills, quick learner, analytical skills, at ease asking questions, comfortable in clinical setting, organizational/planning skills

Time commitment

We ask for a commitment of at least one semester, summer hours are also available, 3-4 hours per day, one to three times a week (one day minimum, if you would like more time then that can be arranged) Monday thru Thursday from 9:00AM-4PM or Wednesday's from 9:00AM-7:00PM
