- ❖ Students must complete a total of two courses with an SWS attribute
- ❖ Students should complete an average of 30 credits per year to earn the required 120 credits to graduate within a 4-year time span
- ❖ The block tuition rate is for 12-15 credits. You will pay additional tuition for any credits over 15
- ❖ Students who self-place into WRT120 should take this course in the fall semester and then take WRT 130 in the winter semester of the first year. Students who self-place into WRT 150 should take this course in the fall semester of the first year. A grade of C or higher is required to fulfill these requirements.

**Guide for Declaring the History Major**

1. Log into myBanner from the GVSU homepage
2. Once logged in select “Student”, “Student Records”, and then, “Change Major”
3. Click on the “Change Major 1/Program” box
4. Click on the down arrow in the box next to “New Major 1/Program,” from here scroll down and choose “History-BA” **OR** “History-BS”
5. Click “Submit” and then “Change to New Program”
