<sup>1</sup> Students who feel the need for some additional writing support may want to choose WRT 120/130, to be taken in the fall and winter semesters of your first year. These two courses will fulfill your General Ed. writing requirement. Students who self-place into WRT 150 should normally take this course in the winter semester of their first year.

Students will not need to take WRT 150 if they have earned credit for the course through AP/Dual Enrollment. A grade of C or better is required in WRT 150 in order to satisfy the WRT 150 requirement at GVSU.
