You will pay additional tuition for any credits over 15 *A major GPA of 2.0 or higher is required.

<sup>1</sup> Students who self-place into WRT 120/130 should take the 120 course in the fall semester and then take WRT 130 in the winter semester of their first year. Students who self-place into WRT 150 should normally take this course in the winter semester of their first year.

Students will not need to take WRT 150 if they have earned credit for the course through AP/Dual Enrollment. A grade of C or better is required in WRT 150 in order to satisfy the WRT 150 requirement at GVSU.

### Guide for Declaring the Philosophy Major

1. Log into myBanner from the GVSU homepage
