¹ Students who self-place into WRT 120 should take this course in the fall semester and then take WRT 130 in the winter semester of the first year. Philosophy students who self-place into WRT 150 can take this course in either semester. A grade of C or higher is required to fulfill these requirements.

Students will not need to take WRT 150 (or 120 & 130) if they have earned credit for the course through AP/Dual Enrollment. A grade of C or better is required.

² Students must complete a total of two courses with an SWS attribute.

³ Philosophy students must complete a Bachelor of Arts requirement; the BA degree requirements are three semesters of a foreign language (Lang 101, Lang 102, Lang 201), but it is recommended to complete the 202 course in whichever foreign language you choose.

⁴ Philosophy students must complete four electives, one of which must be at the 400 level. See reverse for options.

1. Log into myBanner from the GVSU homepage
