<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> Students who self-place into WRT 150 (4 Credits) for their writing foundations requirement may take this course in either semester of their first year. Students who self-place into WRT120 (3 Credits) should take this course in the fall semester and then take WRT 130 (3 Credits) in the winter semester of the first year. A grade of C or higher is required in WRT 130 or WRT 150 to fulfill the writing foundations requirement. Students will not need to take WRT 150 (or 120 & 130) if they have earned credit for the course through AP/Dual Enrollment.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> Students must complete a total of two courses with an SWS attribute. .

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>3</sup> Philosophy students must complete a Bachelor of Arts requirement; the BA degree requirements are three semesters of a foreign language (Lang 101, Lang 102, Lang 201), but it is recommended to complete the 202 course in whichever foreign language you choose.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>4</sup> Philosophy students must complete four electives, one of which must be at the 400 level. See reverse for options.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>5</sup> Philosophy students are typically advised to explore a minor or second major given the quantity of open elective credit that is available.
