WRT 150 can take it in either semester during their first year. Students will not need to take WRT 150 if they have earned credit for the course through AP/Dual Enrollment. A grade of C or better (**NOT A-C-**) is required in WRT 130 or 150 to satisfy the WRT requirement.
