¹ Students who would prefer additional writing support may take WRT 120 in the fall semester and WRT 130 in the winter semester. This option will satisfy the General Education WRT 150 component. Students who self-place into WRT 150 should normally take this course in the winter semester of their first year. Students will not need to take WRT 150 if they have earned credit for the course through AP/Dual Enrollment. A grade of C or better is required in WRT 150 in order to satisfy the WRT 150 requirement at GVSU.

Guide for Declaring the Theatre Major

1. Log into myBanner from the GVSU homepage
2. Once logged in, select "Student", "Student Records", and then, "Change Major"
3. Click on the "Change Major 1/Program" box
4. Click on the down arrow in the box next to "New Major 1/Program," from here scroll down and choose "Theatre-BA" bachelor of Arts **OR** "Theatre-BS" bachelor of science, depending on your degree
5. Click "Submit" and then "Change to New Program"
