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Veterinary Medical School Admission Requirements (VMSAR) www.aavmc.org/Publications/VMSAR.aspx

Admissions Test: GRE General Test (as of this publication 6 schools require the GRE) www.ets.org/gre

Fee: \$205 per test [reschedule fee: \$50; change of test center fee: \$50]

Fee includes score reports to 4 schools, \$27 for each additional school (scores must be sent to each school you are applying to, they do not get sent to VMCAS).

Release Scores: After taking the exam, please share an official score report with a preprofessional advisor at GVSU.

Limit: One test every 21 days, up to 5 in a 12-month period

Scoring: 130-170 per section for Verbal and Quantitative Reasoning, scored in 1-point increments.

Writing is scored 0-6, in ½ point increments. You will see your unofficial scores for the Verbal Reasoning and Quantitative Reasoning measures at the test center. Your official scores will be available in your ETS Account and sent to your score recipients approximately 10–15 days after your test date. Official scores must be submitted by the VMCAS deadline.

Fee: \$220 for one school; \$120 for each additional school. See Help Center for more information.

*Fee is non-refundable, must be paid online by credit/debit card

*A limited number of fee waivers are provided on a first-come, first-served basis to qualified individuals. Includes the cost of the initial application fee.

Transcripts: Transcripts must be sent from EACH school you have attended. GVSU transcripts can be sent electronically (see [Registrar's Office](#) for info). If sending through mail, a Transcript Request Form (download from VMCAS) MUST accompany official transcripts by VMCAS deadline. We advise that you get an official transcript to use for the transcript entry process.

Re-applicants: You can roll over certain parts of your previous application.

Repeat Grades: Enter ALL attempts at courses, regardless of repeats or grades of W. VMCAS counts ALL attempts of a repeated course in the GPA calculations.

Personal statement: Up to 3,000 characters (with spaces) to explain why you want to pursue a career in veterinary medicine.

Related Work & Activities: Enter veterinary experience, animal experience, employment, extracurricular activities, volunteer, research, and honors and awards; each experience has room for a brief description (600 characters, including spaces). VMCAS does allow for high school experiences, but nothing from middle school or earlier. Only list one vet name (supervisor) if you worked at a clinic with multiple vets. Only completed experiences will be listed, NO FUTURE experiences are accepted.

Explanation Statement: While this section is NOT REQUIRED, you can use it to record information that could not be listed anywhere else within the application to provide the admissions committee(s) additional information that you consider vital to your application. This might include missing parental information, disciplinary action(s), COVID-19 impact, etc. You have 3,000 characters (including spaces) for this statement.

Letters of Evaluations (LOEs): VMCAS requires a minimum of 3 letters of evaluation to be requested (max. 6). A committee letter is not required, and most vet schools prefer individual letters of evaluation. A mix of letters from faculty and practicing vets is recommended, be mindful of individual school requirements regarding letters. Evaluators will submit letters directly to VMCAS which MUST be submitted by the application deadline thus it is important to identify evaluators early.

Supplemental Applications: You will complete a “program page” for each school you apply to within VMCAS. You may also be asked to complete an external secondary application from schools. All external fees and materials should be submitted directly to the school. Be mindful of deadlines and completing supplemental applications in a timely manner, we advise no longer than two weeks.

CASPer: As of this publication, there are 12 vet schools that require CASPer which is an online situational judgement test. For more info, visit www.takecasper.com.

Verification: During verification, VMCAS performs a line-by-line comparison of the information you entered in the Coursework section of the application with the information on your official transcript(s). It can take an average of two weeks for completed applications to be verified.

Acceptances: Once you have accepted an offer at one school you are expected to withdraw all outstanding applications. Acceptance deadline is April 15th; no response is required until then. Make sure you are meeting any university deadlines.

It takes three weeks for application verification after transcripts are received by VMCAS.	
September – January	Schools process applications; Applicants can provide academic updates in VMCAS
February – March	Initial Decisions/Offers are made
April 15, 2023	Acceptance decisions are due from applicants

As of this publication, there are 33 accredited veterinary schools in the United States (two Texas schools do not use VMCAS). There are five accredited Canadian vet schools (two do not use VMCAS), and 16 accredited international vet schools (five do not use VMCAS). Most schools have a fall program start.

This form serves only as a guideline to the application process, it is up to you as the applicant to make sure you are meeting any deadlines or requirements outlined by the application and testing services, as well as individual school requirements.
