Trauma-Informed Care Workshop

Session #1: Thursday, August 8, 2013 9:00am-12:00pm

Caelan Kuban is Director of The National Institute for Trauma and Loss in Children (TLC), a program of the Starr Institute for Training. Caelan provides training across the country to professionals working with traumatized children and families; she has been called an excellent teacher and passionate trainer providing workshops where participants leave feeling energized and inspired to work with at-risk and traumatized youth.

Workshop Overview:

This training provides the foundation of Trauma Informed Care. Participants will learn the differences between grief and trauma and how to see trauma as an experience rather than a diagnostic category. Participants will learn how to become a “witness” to a child’s traumatic experience to best appreciate the intensity of the experience and the needs of the child; to see what he now sees as he looks at himself and the world around him.

Autism Awareness Workshop

Dr. Jamie Owen-DeSchryver is an Associate Professor of Psychology at GVSU where she teaches courses in Clinical Psychology and Special Education, and conducts research in the area of autism. She earned her Doctorate Degree in Clinical Psychology from the State University of New York at Stony Brook, and her Master’s Degree in Special Education from Johns Hopkins University. Dr. Owen-DeSchryver has worked with individuals with autism in schools, as well as in home and community settings. She is also Project Faculty on the Statewide Autism Resources and Training (START) project, an MDE-funded grant project that supports public school personnel to implement effective educational services for students with autism spectrum disorders.

Autism Safety Specialist, Autism Alliance of Michigan

Scott Schuelke is the Autism Safety Specialist for the Autism Alliance of Michigan (AAOM) and has been instrumental in the Autism safety training movement in Michigan. His dedication and efforts have resulted in high-quality training for law enforcement, emergency services, and communities (local organizations, families, schools and educators) and has trained over 5,000 individuals. Sgt. Schuelke retired from the Lansing Police Department in 2010. At the Lansing Police Department he served as a supervisor in the Investigations Division, Special Operations Unit, Special Tactics and Rescue Team, and Road Patrol. Sgt. Schuelke was a committee member that developed *Ingham County Safe Schools*, a training that taught Ingham County school employees lock down procedures in case of an active violence incident. He was also instrumental in developing *Active Violence Incident Response Training* for all law enforcement in Clinton, Eaton and Ingham Counties. Sgt. Schuelke was also the Lansing Police Department liaison to the Lansing School District. He is a Ferris State University graduate.

Workshop Overview

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recently reported that 1 in 88 children has been identified with an Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD). Individuals with ASD, including those with both Asperger Syndrome and Autism, show differences in social and communication skills, as well as restricted and repetitive patterns of behavior. These characteristics can result in many challenges for professionals who are working with this population. This session will provide basic information about ASD to facilitate an understanding of the unique behaviors of those on the spectrum. Presenters will also review strategies that will help participants identify and interact with individuals with autism more successfully. Special attention will be given to the challenges of working with those ASD within the context of the legal system.

Mike Dunn is a full time faculty member at Cooley Law School at the Grand Rapids Campus. He serves as Director of the Access to Justice Clinic and works with students to obtain instruction and experience in domestic and family related law. Prior to joining Cooley, Mike was a partner at Dunn Gibbons, PLC, in Grand Rapids where he focused on state and federal criminal law, family law, child abuse, neglect and delinquency. He served as an adjunct professor at Cooley from 2008-2011, teaching Moot Court, Criminal Practice, Drunk Driving Law and Practice, Child Abuse and Neglect, Children and the Law, and Pre-Trial Practice. He also helped implement the Grand Rapids Teen Court Program. At Cooley, Professor Dunn continues to teach the classes he taught as an adjunct, including Family Law, Children and the Law and Child Abuse and Neglect.

In 2005, Professor Krause-Phelan joined the Cooley faculty as a Visiting Professor teaching Criminal Law. She became a full-time Professor at Cooley in 2006. Before joining Cooley, Professor Krause-Phelan worked as both a private criminal defense practitioner and as an Assistant Public Defender with the Kent County Office of the Defender in Grand Rapids. While in private practice, Professor Krause-Phelan served as adjunct faculty for the School of Criminal Justice at Ferris State University, where she taught Criminal Law and Criminal Procedure. During her years in practice, Professor Krause-Phelan lectured on a variety of criminal law topics, including "Junk Science in the Courtroom: Cross-Examining the Child Sexual Abuse Accommodations Syndrome Expert" and "Getting Experts in Court-Appointed Cases." She has also served on the faculty for the Hillman Trial Advocacy Program. Professor Krause-Phelan has served as co-editor and editor of *The Informant*, a publication of the former Kent County Criminal Defense Bar. She also has served as editor of *Right to Counsel*, a publication of the Criminal Defense Attorneys of Michigan. At Cooley, Professor Krause-Phelan teaches Criminal Law and Criminal Procedure.



Workshop Overview

The lectures will cover what is new in Michigan legislation as well as what is in the hopper. Additional topics will include: Juvenile waivers, juvenile competency, expungements for juveniles, Sex Offender Registry issues, case updates and court rules.
