Methods of Evaluation

Exams (80%)

- There will be four Online MC exams.
- Each exam weights 20%. (Total = $20\% \times 4 = 80\%$)
- These exams are NOT cumulative
- All these exams are open book. Some questions are comprehension questions. You will read the textbook to find the answers. Some questions are analytic questions. You cannot find the answers directly from the textbook or lecture notes.
- Each exam is preceded by a mock exam. You will earn 10% participation marks by completing the four mock exams (see *Top Hat Polls* below).

Top Hat Polls (10%)

- There will be 4 Top Hat Polls (all questions are MC). The last day to complete these polls is Dec 13.
- These polls can be completed during lectures on the exam review days (see the table above) or as homework assignments.

To avoid plagiarism be sure to do your own work and put information in your own words. Use of quotes with appropriate reference to the original source from which you got the information or ideas is acceptable but less preferred than paraphrasing (with referencing of the source provided) in psychological writing.
