#### **Course Objectives**

This introductory 45-hour undergraduate course provides the student with information in the form of lectures, demonstrations, and practical exercises on the basic principles and procedures of the field of Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA). Students will be introduced to the field of ABA and will receive training on how to become fluent in applying basic principles and procedures of ABA to their career. In addition, this course will prepare students for advanced undergraduate coursework in ABA. Lastly, this course is designed to prepare students to sit for the Board Certified Assistant Behavior Analyst Certification exam. - Describe basic behavior analysis principles
- Provide novel examples of basic behavior analysis principles
- Describe assessment and intervention procedures in ABA
- Describe and provide examples on how to apply the science of ABA to their future career

#### **Attendance**

Every student will start out with 50pts for attendance. Attendance will be taken on random, unannounced days. When a student is absent, points will be deducted. Any subsequent absences will result in a loss of 10 attendance points.

### **Ouizzes**

Quizzes will be given weekly-day of the week will vary. Quizzes will be based on or directly from the Chapter Quizzes in your book. It is recommended that students complete all quizzes in the book when the reading is assigned.

#### **Exams**

There will be 3 unit exams (50pts each) and one final exam (150pts). The 3 unit exams are non-cumulative. The final exam is cumulative. All exams count toward your final grade. The unit exams may consist of: multiple choice, short answer, true/false, matching, and fill-in-the-blank. The final exam will be multiple choice. Most of the information on the exams will come from lecture, however all material covered in class and in assigned readings is fair game.

## **Course Grade**

Grades will be calculated by dividing the total number of points earned by the total number of points possible. A letter grade will be assigned based on the grading scale listed below.

#### Make-up Policy/Absences

Plagiarism also consists of passing off as one's own segments or the total of another person's work. If you are not sure please bring the material to the instructor for guidance. The student who submitted the subject paper, lab report, etc. shall receive an "F" with a numerical value of zero on the item submitted, and the "F" shall be used to determine the final course grade.
