Course Description: Experimental and survey methods in psychology. Topics covered include philosophy of science; theory development; measurement; reliability and validity of methods; experimental, quasi-experimental, and survey research designs; biases in experimentation; univariate and multivariate data analysis; and research ethics.

Course Objectives: Objectives Upon completion of this course, students will be able to: 1) Explain research methods issues including ethical issues, measurement, reliability and validity of methods, experimental, quasi-experimental and survey research designs, biases in experimentation, and univariate and multivariate data analysis 2) demonstrate the ability to design and conduct an empirical study in psychology. 3) Write a research paper describing a psychology experiment. 4) discuss their study in critical ways by recognizing limits and problems.

Course Prerequisites: PSY 101, STA 215, WRT 150 and PSY 300. You may not take any of these prerequisite courses concurrently with PSY 400.

Top Hat Classroom and Text Book:

One difference with this section compared to some other PSY400 sections is that we will be using a multimedia textbook which *necessitates that you have a reliable, high-speed internet connection*. This format of text allows me more flexibility in selecting the content of your readings and to augment learning concepts with the use of videos and internet resources. One limitation of this format is that a physical copy of the text is not available.
