What skills are important for a Juvenile Forensic Case Manager to have? Juvenile Forensic Case Managers should strive to have strong interpersonal communication skills, oral & written communication skills, empathy and listening skills and the ability to ensure confidentiality of all client's information. In additional, strong organizational skills, the willingness to work within a team or independently, and analytical thinking skills are also important to have.

Employer Possibilities – Case managers are generally employed through governmental agencies (state and local) or non-profit organizations. Examples of specific job titles may include "juvenile case manager" or "family case manager".
