Background -

Licensed therapists work with couples and families in a therapeutic capacity to overcome problems within their relationship. General duties may include encouraging clients to discuss emotions and experiences, leading discussions about the future of the relationship and referring clients to resources in the community. More specific techniques may include cognitive behavioral therapy and other empirically based therapy techniques.

What additional training is required? You will need a masters degree and a clinical license.

What skills are applicable for someone working in this field? Excellent active listening and observation skills, empathy, and interpersonal communication skills, as well as oral and written communication skills are very important. The ability to work independently or within groups, to organize multiple clients and to manage time effectively, as well as to handle stressful situations is applicable to this field.

Employer Possibilities - generally work in private practice, hospitals or mental health centers, substance abuse treatment centers, or nonprofit organizations. It can be hard to get paid for marital and family therapy if you are in private practice because insurance may not cover this treatment.
