#### Course Overview

The aim of this course is to acquaint students with basic topics of cross-cultural psychology. Upon completion of this course you should have an understanding of the concept of culture, the relevance of cultural context for psychological research and some insights into universal and culture-specific aspects of psychological phenomena. Beside the basic textbook specific cross-cultural studies will be discussed. The semester schedule and the specific readings will be announced in the first week of the semester.

## Objectives

Upon successful completion of this course students will be able to:

- 1. Describe the concept of culture as used by psychologists.
- 2. Describe the research methodologies used by cultural and cross-cultural psychologists.
- 3. Identify and describe the ways in which culture influences psychological phenomena.
- 4. Explain that cultural variations and universals both characterize the human experience.
- 5. Think critically about why cultural variations and universals exist.

However, when you use ChatGPT or similar devices to CREATE text you are asked to cite these passages. Failing to mark such text as citation counts as plagiarism and will be graded as Failed.

Example:

When prompted with "Is the left brain right brain divide real or a metaphor?" the ChatGPT-generated text indicated that although the two brain hemispheres are somewhat specialized, "the notation that people can be characterized as 'left-brained' or 'right-brained' is considered to be an oversimplification and a popular myth" (OpenAI, 2023).

# **Assignments**

You will be asked to fulfill six assignments. All assignments will be submitted through assignment manager on Blackboard. The deadline of assignments will be announced in the semester schedule.

#### **Assignment 1: Developmental niche** (40 points)

Interview a person and write an essay related to the concept of developmental niche.

Assignment 2: Article presentation (partner with another student) (40 points)

Present a cross-cultural study in APA style with focus on culture. Write a research paper about a cross-cultural topic related to the presented paper.

**Assignment 3**: **Research paper (30 points):** Select a similar article as presented in AS2 and discuss the commonalities and differences regarding the conceptual and the methodological approach. (30 points)

**Assignment 4: Group presentation of a selected cultural group** (40 points) plus **internal evaluation** (20 points)

Assignment 5: Reports: Short essay related to discussed topics based on the textbook. The report should reflect the ideas and arguments given in the textbook and should include some personal perspective and arguments. Six of the nine reports go into the final grade (60 points). Assignment 6: Reflect about cultural characteristics in Media (30 points). Write an essay along critical questions related to the three-generational story in Georgia.

### Reports

You need to submit 6 out of 9 offered report topics. The reports will refer to the ideas and arguments presented in the textbook. You are also asked to add a personal comment to each report. See also under Assignment 5

#### Quizzes

There will be 9 short online multiple-choice quizzes for each chapter with five questions. The quiz will test the content of the related chapter in the textbook. You will have about ten days to answer. The answer time will be limited to 10 minutes. Eight of the nine quizzes will go into your final grade (40 points). If you miss the deadline of the quiz, 0 points will be in your record for the respective quiz.

#### Exams

There will be a midterm exam in class. The exam is a multiple-choice test with 30 questions. The midterm exam will be on **October 15**.

The final culminative experience will consist in group presentations about various cultural groups from a psychological perspective. We will use the exam time for presentation. As more presentation time is needed, we will already start in the last week of classes (see Schedule).

If you do not participate in the exams or group presentations, you must bring written confirmation from the head of the department or from a physician. If you do not bring any document, I can decide to give you another written exam (max. 70% of the points) and request a recorded version of your part of the group presentation (max. 70% of the points).

#### **Active Contributions**

As this class is partly interactive, you can play an important role regarding the liveliness of the class by getting involved in the discussions, asking questions, and especially commenting on student presentations throughout the semester. There will be several in- class exercises and your active participation is appreciated.

#### Extra Credit

An Extra Credit Task will be offered during the semester. You get a maximum of 10 points.
