#### **Course Overview**

The main objective of this course is to acquaint you with the fundamentals of social psychology – the scientific study of how people think about, influence, and interact with one another. This course is designed to give undergraduate students instruction into the concepts, theories and research involved in the study of how the impact of others influence our feelings, thoughts and behavior.

### **Course Objectives**

Following a brief review of the historical background of the discipline and research methods, the course will examine the major areas of social psychology (i.e., social thinking, social influence, and social relations). Specifically, after completing this course you will be able to:

- **Describe** the basic concepts of social psychology, including concepts and terminology.
- **Identify** basic research methods and application of scientific methods used in the study of social psychology.
- Compare and contrast theoretical approaches to the study of social psychology.
- Identify and evaluate classic and current research in the field of social psychology.
- **Explain** how social psychological theories and concepts apply to people's experiences in everyday social life.

## **Assessments, Grades and Grading Scale**

- WEEKLY QUIZZES: There will be 14 chapter quizzes. A chapter quiz will be available each week throughout the week. All quizzes are open book, open notes. Each chapter quiz needs to be completed by the Sunday 11:59 pm of each week in Bb Ultra. Once you begin the quiz you will have 45 minutes to finish and submit the quiz. Because you have the entire week to complete the quiz, there are no make-up quizzes. You will only have one chance to take each quiz. Quizzes not completed by the weekly deadline will receive a 0. These quizzes are to check your understanding of chapter material and help you prepare for the exams.
- DISCUSSION FORUMS: There will be 10 discussion forums throughout the duration of the course. Specific instructions for each discussion will be posted in each of the corresponding modules in Bb Ultra. *Initial discussion posts are due the Thursday of the assigned week, while 2 response posts are due the following Sunday*. A Discussion Rubric is also provided to help you understand what is expected of you in a discussion and how your work will be evaluated. Discussion boards in this class serve many purposes and are beneficial because they can:
  - Create a collaborative learning environment where you can share ideas and ask questions
  - o **Apply** the concepts and learned material to experiences in your everyday life
  - Provide thoughtful reflection and responses to your classmates
  - Develop critical thinking skills by challenging you to analyze both your response posts as well as your classmates
- EXAMS: There will be 4 exams throughout the semester, none of which are cumulative. Each exam will cover material from the previous exam. Exams will consist of 50 multiple-choice questions. Students are responsible for material from the text, lectures, Ppt notes, and any

content presented within the modules (including content from videos). All exams are open book and open notes. Please note that each exam covers multiple chapters and going into the exam fully prepared will help you succeed – that means reading the assignment material ahead of time. You will have 90 minutes to complete the exam once you begin. You will only have one chance to take each exam. (Please note that during the weeks you have an exam scheduled you will not have a discussion assignment due. This is to give you more time to focus and prepare for the exam).
