Rehabilitation Counselor

Background -

Rehabilitation Counselors work with clients to maximize the client's independence and employability. Generally, someone referred for rehabilitation counseling is coping with personal, social or vocational difficulties that result from illness, disease or stress of daily life. As a counselor you would coordinate care at a treatment facility, assess the needs of the client and implement programs that address personal and vocational goals of the client.

What additional education is required to become a Rehabilitation Counselors?

- 1. Michigan requires that rehab counselors are LPCs
- 2. Master's programs that hold approved accreditation are recognized as license qualifying in the state (e.g., Rehabilitation Counseling programs)
- 3. Internship that is no less than 600 hours
- 4. Supervised Practice Requirement those without a Master's you must work under someone for 2 years and 3,000 hours
- 5. Exam must be approved by Michigan
