Sports Psychologists focus on the mental health aspects of sports and how attitudes, beliefs and mental barriers change athlete performance. The goal of this psychological approach is to reduce limitations and improve performance through identifying the individual client's goals. Specific daily activities may include working directly with athletes, coaches or entire organizations.

What are the additional education requirements to become a sports psychologist?

Generally, an advanced degree (Master's and/or Ph. D) is required to become a sports psychologist. Some universities have undergraduate or Master's programs in sports or applied psychology.
