Transferable skills

Some history majors become professional historians, teachers or professors, however, most pursue work in other fields. The reason for this is that majors gain a number of skills that are easily transferred and useful in many careers. In any profession skills such as critical thinking, effective writing, research and problem solving and the ability to communicate coherent arguments orally are integral to future success.

- Critical Thinking Skills: A significant part of any job is making informed decisions based on a critical analysis of facts and information. Looking at things from many perspectives, assessing sources and documents; history majors bring four years of rigorous thinking and analysis to their future careers.
- Writing Skills: Communicating ideas that are well presented and thoughtful is vital for success. History majors have learned the art of careful reading and writing and they bring this well-developed skill set to any job.
- Research and Problem Solving: Research involves asking questions and seeking answers, it requires curiosity and the ability to organize material into a coherent narrative. Researching the origin or root of a policy often provides context to current practice and can bring perspective and insight.
- Oral Communication: In the workplace, it is important to communicate clearly and effectively. Through individual presentations, discussion sections and group projects, students learn the art of verbal communication and develop the ability to speak persuasively.
