How would you describe the Women, Gender, & Sexuality Studies (WGS) Major?

"The best words that come to mind when describing WGS as a major are: knowledge as power, perspective-shifting, community-building, and a space for real-life practice."

A major in Women, Gender, and Sexuality studies is engaging, transformative, and relevant.

What topics would I be studying in this major?

Some topics include: the social constructions of gender and sexuality; community and social change; global feminisms; critical media studies; gender and health; gender and environment and intersectionality.

What made was



pick WGS as a major?

"I didn't - the major chose me! A friend recommended I take WGS 200 my sophomore year as an elective. This class helped me contextualize and understand questions that were floating around in my mind, it helped me feel seen as a Latina

immigrant, and it challenged my perspectives and understandings of the world around me. I declared WGS as my major by the end of the semester."."

How do you use your WGS degree?

"My WGS degree has helped me develop a career deeply invested in supporting individuals in navigating their identities, addressing systemic injustice, and understanding creative solutions for social and cultural obstacles. I have worked in child welfare, program development, resource coordination, and now run my own therapy practice."

WGS students apply their education to careers in:

- Non-profit organizations
- · Teaching and administration
- Counseling
- Social services
- Government and international nongovernmental agencies
- Politics and lobbying

What out of the classroom experiences did you gain from your program?

"I gained so many experiences from this program! I interned for the Women's Resource

through the Women's

Community Collaborative program, which was my first exposure to the non-profit world and helped me figure out ways in which my skillset could be beneficial to community work. I was connected to the Planned Parenthood Advocate community of West Michigan, which offered opportunities to engage in community action and legislative efforts. I studied abroad in South Africa, where I was challenged to explore my own assumptions, the differences between change on paper and real social change, and my responsibilities as I benefit from various privileges. I attended the National Women's Studies Association Conference, where I was able to connect with people from around the country, and explore ideas and movements in various areas of social and environmental justice. I also continue to maintain relationships with colleagues and professors, which have provided support, guidance, and solidarity through the events of the past decade"

What is something that makes WGS stand out?

WGS students are passionate about combining critical and analysis and action to improve their communities on and off campus. The faculty are committed to providing a space for rigorous discussion and learning in a supportive feminist community.



What are tips for someone considering WGS as a major?

"I recommend allowing yourself to enter this major with willingness

to learn, be flexible, and think

critically. I also recommend not worrying too much about the major-to-career pathway.

Although this major is not built to streamline students into one specific career field, it is

adaptive, critical, and productive. In the words of Dr. DeMuth, we need feminists everywhere, and this major allows you to think creatively about how your skillsets and passions can lead to true, practical change in various fields. (Also, be ready to read - but they are interesting readings! I still refer to them today!)"


