-Excerpted from Great is Small, Small is Great, by Easton Lee (1931-2021)


As we enter the 'summer break,' I hope you find a few moments, chunks of time or long breaks to slow down, embrace and enjoy your place in our tapestry.

CECI Unit Spotlight



Six students from Grand Valley State University's Hospitality and Tourism Management (HTM) program within the School of Community Leadership and Development (SCLD) participated in the second annual Hotel Turnaround Collegiate Championship in New Orleans, April 14-17, 2025, at the Asian American Hotel Owners Association (AAHOA) annual convention (AAHOACON25).

Fourteen teams from around the country came together to battle it out at AAHOACON25 for the championship. During the competition, students had to navigate a simulation program, HOTELsim, that enabled them to make decisions mirroring real-life challenges faced by hospitality professionals. These decisions included staffing, pricing, cost control, revenue management, operations, marketing and advertising, and capital investment. Each team of students "acquired" a hotel that was financially identical in terms of performing in the same market and having the same key performance indicators. Teams used HOTELsim to implement ownership strategies to improve hotel valuation, future profit potential, and net positive cash flow. The teams who were selected for the finals were decided upon based on their financial decision making and overall operations. Once in the finals, students completed a pitch to a panel of industry experts and took questions from the panel on their performance and decision making.

Industry professionals praised the students for their knowledge and hard work while watching them compete in the competition. "The future of our industry depends on the next generation of hoteliers, and the AAHOA Collegiate Championship: Hotel Turnaround Competition is an incredible way to showcase their talent and creativity," AAHOA Chairman Kamalesh (KP) Patel said. "This competition challenges students to think like hotel owners, preparing them for the real-world decisions that drive success."

"We are thrilled to celebrate the talented and innovative winners of the 2025 AAHOA Collegiate Championship: Hotel Turnaround Competition," AAHOA President & CEO Laura Lee Blake said. "This competition continues to highlight the exceptional skills and creativity of students from top hospitality management programs as they tackle real-world challenges in hotel ownership. Watching their teamwork and problem-solving in action is truly inspiring."

Celebrations



Dr. Sal Alaimo, Professor in the Public, Nonprofit, and Health Administration (PNHA) program within the School of Community Leadership and Development (SCLD), received the 2025 Student Award for Faculty Excellence at the GVSU Student Life Awards this past April. This annual award recognizes a faculty member who has made outstanding contributions to the GVSU community by supporting students and the University's mission, vision, and values. The recipient of this award inspires excellent academic achievement in the classroom, and has demonstrated experiences of connecting and supporting students beyond what is expected of them.

In early April, students from the School of Criminology, Criminal Justice, and Legal Studies (SCCJLS) Cold Case Investigation class presented to the Michigan State Police Sixth District Command on their findings of the Robert "Bobby" Joe Thompson cold case homicide from 1993. The students assisted by scanning documents and making this case digitally accessible allowing for greater search capabilities. In the week following, Dr. Carrie Buist, along with graduate alumni, Narelle Hickmon, '24, and current undergraduate students (Halle Bauer, Erin Peters, Kayla Walter, and Madeline DeLong) were invited to speak at the Michigan State Police Sixth District Command Conference at Embassy Suites. Dr. Buist and the students were able to discuss the cold case partnership and its positive impact on our



students and the community, highlighting the importance of theoretical and practical applications through experiential learning.



CENTER FOR EDUCATIONAL PARTNERSHIPS

The Center for Educational Partnerships (CEP) was awarded a Team Achievement Award at the AP Awards Luncheon this past April. The NOAA BWET Meaningful Watershed Environmental Education (MWEE) project was a collaborative and impactful effort between GVSU departments: the Center for Educational Partnerships (CEP), WGVU Broadcasting, Office of Sponsored Programs, and the Annis Water Resources Institute. Receiving this award is a testament to the dedication, creativity, and passion of our Center for Educational Partnerships Team in CECI. From the early stages of the grant proposal to the final deliverables, each member brought their unique expertise to the table to create a lasting impact on environmental education across our region. Vicky Wright, Assistant Director, served as the principal investigator. She ensured this grant was carried out efficiently and with all parties involved and informed, and her organization brought all aspects of the work together cohesively. Clay Pelon, Director, was the primary author on the original grant application and recipient of the funding, and his partnership work with WGVU laid the foundation for a successful collaboration with their team. Allison Palm, Place-Based Education Specialist, and Mara Spears, **Project Specialist**, connected directly with Kent and Ottawa educators through hands-on workshops at the Groundswell Summer Institute, turning ideas into practice in the classroom. Through strong leadership, creative media production, and hands-on educator support, the team created a comprehensive MWEE Toolkit that brings place-based environmental education to life; you can view the toolkit online at the Groundswell Stewardship Initiative website. This award honors the collective effort that went into creating a resource that will continue to support educators and inspire students for years to come.

Literacy Studies faculty and students from the Literacy, Educational Foundations, and Technology Department (LEFT) were out in force representing GVSU at the Michigan Reading Association's annual conference in Grand Rapids. With support from LEFT's Special Projects Grant and funding from GVSU's Office of Undergraduate Research and Scholarship, the Literacy Studies team attended the conference along with 12 undergraduate and graduate students. As part of the *Mentoring into the Literacy Profession* initiative, faculty members mentored students over the past year to develop and implement their own research presentations related to literacy education. This partnership resulted in three group presentations: Dr. Christina Ponzio, Assistant Professor, collaborated with graduate students Briana Albert and Sara Weeks in presenting their session, Who's at the Center? Cultivating a Critical Lens to Building and Integrating Culturally Relevant Text Sets. Jennifer Vanderground, Affiliate Faculty, partnered with undergraduate students Ellie Esman and Tyler Peery to deliver their session on Maximizing Phonics Success: Practical Strategies for Multisensory Engagement and Orthographic Mapping. Dr. Lindsay Stoetzel, Assistant Professor, presented with Angela Gonzalez-Urbina and Lexi Marzolf (graduate students) and Matilyn Mumm (undergraduate student) on Growing Together: Writing into Social Emotional Learning.





Mei Mah, Associate Director of the Center for Educational Partnerships (CEP), was honored with the Commitment to Diversity Award at the GVSU AP Awards in April. A deeply deserving recipient, every accomplishment highlighted by her nominators took place within or in collaboration with CECI. Mei has long demonstrated a commitment to growing the numbers of educators of color teaching in PK-12 schools. She is a Steelcase Social Innovation Fellow through a partnership with KConnect, a Kent County publicprivate collective impact organization. Mei assisted KConnect in securing a \$166,000 grant to continue diversifying efforts within the teacher workforce, and also has co-created a Kent County-wide educators of color collaborative for in-service/retired educators. Mei champions support for pre-service educators of color at GVSU as an advisor for the Educators of Color Network (ECN), and works across her unit, college, and the local community to help ECN become the strong, successful registered student organization that it is. Mei has been the principal investigator of the six year ongoing grant-funded project, WKKF BCPS GVSU Educational Transformation Partnership, to support work in underserved communities in Battle Creek, MI. She has also played a key role as one of the lead staff members for the Rep4 program. Her efforts to build connections with other universities, secure university-wide support from WGVU and senior leadership, and elevate the program have broadened perspectives and created new opportunities for participating students. These are just a few of her varied projects and extensive efforts, and it was clear to her entire team why she was the recipient of this year's award.

GVSU's Writing Department featured <u>Bellamy Creek Program's</u> students who were enrolled in WRT 130: Strategies in Writing - Stretch II as the cover story of the Winter 2025 edition of <u>InWriting</u>, their departmental newsletter, which is written and edited entirely by students majoring or minoring in writing. Amy Ferdinandt Stolley, Ph.D., Writing Department Chair, recently praised the collaborative efforts across GVSU, noting that Aaron Yore-VanOsterhout, Acting Director of the Bellamy Creek Program, and Jackie Doyon-Martin, Director of the School of Criminology, Criminal Justice, and Legal Studies (SCCJLS), were instrumental in bringing the program to life through their "administrative coordination and leadership." Ferdinandt Stolley concluded by saying, "GVSU's Bellamy Creek Program embodies the inclusive, transformative education we strive to offer all our students. I hope we continue to expand our offerings, and I think there is incredible potential to connect students in Grand Rapids and Allendale with the students at Bellamy Creek so they might learn together."

As the fiscal year end grows closer and closer (June 30), please help your unit prepare by doing the following:

- <u>Customize your Workday notifications</u> so you don't miss important alerts and/or tasks you need to complete.
 - Please change your settings for "Notification Type: Tasks" and
 "Notification Type: To-Dos" to either "Immediately" or "Daily" so you'll be
 alerted when there is something in Workday that you're required to complete.
- Please check your Expenses Hub to see if there are any pending expense card (formerly P-card) transactions that you need to reconcile or any draft expense reports



you still need to submit or delete.

- To find: Workday > Menu (upper left corner) > Personal > Expenses Hub.
- Submit final reports for any CSCE/FTLC conference grants you received ASAP.
 - Your unit cannot request reimbursement until your conference expense report and grant report have been submitted and fully approved.
- Year-Round Reminders:
 - GVSU expense cards must be reconciled at the end of every month.
 - Mileage must be submitted every 45 days (monthly would be preferred).
 - All employees should submit their expense reports in a timely manner DO NOT save up all of your expenses throughout a semester to submit in one
 expense report at the end of the semester.

EXPENSE REPORT DEADLINE: All expense reports containing expenses from May 2025 or older MUST BE SUBMITTED in Workday by May 31. June 2025 expense reports should be for new expenses incurred in June only. Please do not delay in submitting your reports! Reminder: Per university policy, expense reports for travel should be submitted within 30 days of completion of travel (SLT 6.18).

Publications/Presentations

The <u>Michigan Literacy Project (MLP)</u> was featured in the Spring 2025 edition of *Grand Valley Magazine*. "<u>Stocking the Shelves</u>" shares how MLP is helping to provide quality classroom libraries to recent Education graduates, and highlights a recent volunteer opportunity current Education students participated in where they each received 240 books to build their future classroom's library in exchange for their time and effort. Project Coordinators of the MLP are <u>Megan Freudigmann and Sheryl Vlietstra</u>, both Senior Affiliate Faculty members in the <u>Department of Teaching and Learning (T&L)</u>.

Tova Hartle, faculty with **Educational Leadership and Counseling (ELC)**, presented a roundtable session at the National Association for Humanistic Counseling (AHC) conference in Safety Harbor, Florida, on April 26. The topic, *Strength in Practice: Vicarious Resilience from Schools to the Community*, examined the ways in which vicarious resilience can mitigate the impacts of vicarious trauma, compassion fatigue, and burnout, while helping mental health professionals find deeper meaning within their work.

Laila McCloud, Assistant Professor in **Educational Leadership and Counseling (ELC)**, was recently published in the *Journal of Student Affairs Research and Practice* [Special Issue], 62(2) for "The future of student affairs work," and also in the *Journal of Diversity in Higher Education* for "Communal rest *is* resistance: A spiritual balm for Black faculty in academe."

Lindsay Stoetzel, Assistant Professor in the **Literacy, Educational Foundations, and Technology Department** (**LEFT**), co-authored the article, "Video-based Reflection as a Tool for Instructional Coach Development" published in the journal *Teaching and Teacher Education*.

Lorie A. Tuma, Associate Professor of Hospitality and Tourism Management (HTM), within the School of Community Leadership and Development (SCLD), represented GVSU at the "Teaching with Al" seminar hosted by Harvard Business School. Led by Professor Mitchell Weiss of Harvard Kennedy School, the seminar brought together faculty from numerous countries to explore how generative Al is transforming higher education. Through interactive case discussions and applied learning activities, participants examined ways to integrate Al into course design, improve student engagement, and uphold academic integrity. The seminar emphasized practical, forward-thinking approaches to preparing students for an Al-influenced future.

Road Access:

- Starting May 15, Mt. Vernon between Douglas and Lake Michigan Dr. will be closed for 7 days to begin utility relocation activities. This closure will also include the off-ramp from 131 Southbound to Pearl St.
- Summer Ave. will be closed starting May 19, between Blumrich St. and Lake Michigan Dr.
