The Kutsche Office received a Third Coast Conversations grant from the Michigan Humanities Council to support our project "Connections Along the Grand River," which captures the histories of the communities and towns along the Grand River—how they came into being—and the role of the river in their survival and revitalization. This project involves working with local history organizations whose communities runs alongside the river. These organizations will share the histories of their communities as it relates to the Grand River's impact on industry, agriculture, fishing, and recreation as well as the community's growth from its founding to present day.

Contemporary Stories of Saugatuck

Launched this month "Contemporary Stories of Saugatuck" will capture the voices of the Class of 2019 at Saugatuck High School. Central to "Contemporary Stories of Saugatuck" is a deep commitment to encouraging area youth to see themselves as participants in history. Often history is considered to be something that happened in the past. Yet, the Kutsche Office recognizes how history also includes stories, ephemera, and photographs, for example, of the present. Youth are a key component to understanding a community and what daily life is like. Instead of asking them to reflect on their teenage years when they're adults, this project centers their voices and their experiences as active participants in shaping the history of their community. Empowering youth through local history is a core component of the work of the Kutsche Office.

This project will culminate in an exhibition at the Old School House in Douglas, MI in May 2019. The exhibition will feature portrait boards of the Class of 2019 with excerpts of oral histories and photographs of each student. The project reflects a partnership between the Kutsche Office, the Saugatuck Douglas History Center, and students enrolled in the 2018-2019 journalism courses of Christina Lewis at Saugatuck High School.

Stories of Summer

Stories of Summer documents the Saugatuck-Douglas area's rise to become a lakeshore destination that welcomed diverse communities in the mid-twentieth century, and other contemporary stories as a way to foster dialogue and a great sense of community among all area residents. The Kutsche Office in partnership with the Saugatuck Douglas History Center held two history harvests on June 2 and July 21 at the Old School House in Douglas, MI. The history harvests resulted in the digitization of more than 1,100

objects of ephemera including postcards, photographs, and brochures. Three additional dates to collect oral histories occurred in June. A total of 22 oral histories have been collected to date.

Throughout this academic year, our special projects graduate assistant Mollie VanOrsdol and undergraduate research assistant Kendra Garcia will support the oral history transcription and metadata collection processes. We are working with GVSU's Special Collections and Archives to make these materials available online to the public.

In February 2019, the Kutsche Office will unveil our first exhibit from the project in the Mary Idema Pew Library. Please stay tuned for more details concerning its opening and reception. The exhibit will also be installed at the Old School House in June 2019.
