The historical charting of Grand Rapids women's runs for public office upends conventional wisdom and offers surprises about dates, the numbers of races, and the identities of losers as women who participated in local politics beginning in 1887. Julia Bouwkamp and Jo Ellyn Clarey will report on how the national crowdsourcing project *Her Hat Was in the Ring* invited local researchers to share their data with the world, helping others complete and complicate American women's history by seeking out every woman who ran before 1920. 

We're excited to announce our keynote speaker is Ronald J. Stephens, an authority on the African American resort community of Idlewild, Michigan. Stephens' research focuses on African American rural and urban communities, as well as 20th century African American culture, identity, history, and political thought. He is author of *Idlewild: The Rise, Decline and Rebirth of a Unique African American Resort Town* (University of Michigan Press, 2013);

Idlewild: The Black Eden of Michigan (Arcadia Publishing, 2001), as well as co-author of *African Americans of Denver* (Arcadia Publishing 2008). In addition to authoring books and articles, and serving as a media consultant on Idlewild and other topics in African American Studies, he is co-curator of *Welcome to Idlewild*, a Michigan State University Museum traveling photographic exhibition (2003-present).

We are happy to also feature the scholarship of Dr. Kathryn Remlinger and Dr. Andrea Riley-Mukavetz. Dr. Remlinger, Professor of English at GVSU is the recipient of the inaugural Kutsche Office Community Collaboration Grant and will discuss her research, "How Much Dutch: The Linguistic Landscape of Holland, Michigan." Dr. Riley-Mukavetz, Assistant Professor of Liberal Studies at GVSU will share her experiences working on two separate oral history projects with Odawa women from Lansing, Michigan. She will highlight a multigenerational, relational, and indigenous approach to oral history work.
